HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE AT HALIFAX

(Special to the Guardian) HALIFAX, N. S., August 17.—The Prince of Wales attended divine service aboard the Dragon at nine o'clock this morning, before entering Halifax harbor, then transferred immediately after anchoring to the Renown where he received commanding officers of the Italian and French warships. He then made a short inspection of all the foreign vessels. His Royal Highness returned to lunch on the Renown. After lunch he landed in civilian clothes at Point Pleasant and strolled through the park to the head of the northwest arm. Then he made a tour around the citadel and embarked from the dockyard at 5 o'clock in the evening. His Royal Highness gave a dinner on the Renown to which were invited the Lieutenant Governor, Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, Premier George H. Murray, General Thatcher, G. O. C. and others. Sir Robert Borden has joined the Renown as the guest of the Prince until the official landing at Quebec. The British ships in port were brilliantly illuminated tonight and presented a magnificent spectacle. In leaving the Halifax Club to visit the Prince of Wales on the Renown this evening Sir Robert Borden slipped on the stairs and wrenched a muscle in his leg. Dr. Edward Farrell's injury was painful but not serious. Sir Robert proceeded to the ship early this morning, so early that the majority of the citizens were abed and knew little of what was happening. The Reception at Halifax. HALIFAX, N. S., August 17.—His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was given an enthusiastic welcome by the Province of Nova Scotia when he left the dock yards this afternoon and subsequently drove in procession through three miles of gay streets lined with veterans of the Great War to the Provincial Building where he received and replied to addresses from the province and corporation of Halifax. The Prince landed at the dock yard promptly at ten o'clock and as he stepped off the marble slabs which marked the landing of the late King Edward VII on July 29, 1869, the standard was broken from the landing stage mast head, the band of the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery played the National Anthem, and the guns at the citadel fired the Royal salute. The Prince remained standing at the salute until the National Anthem had been concluded and then greeted Lieutenant Governor Grant, Premier Murray, General Thacker, Captain Walter Hose and officials of the Italian and French warships, the Mayor of Halifax and other officials. Sir Robert Borden was not present owing to his injured ankle. The Prince then inspected the Guard of Honor which had been supplied by the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery stopping to chat with several of the men who were decorated.

SIR ARTHUR CURRIE ARRIVES IN HALIFAX

(Special to the Guardian) HALIFAX, August 18.—Welcomed back to the homeland, Lt. General Sir Arthur Currie, gallant soldier and commander of one of the most daring and glorious bodies of troops in the world's history, the Canadian Army Corps, General Currie arrived here on the Cunard liner Caronia which docked at 6 o'clock. At twenty minutes to 8 just before he boarded his private car which was attached to the Ocean Limited at the Southend Station he was waited upon by representatives of the civic corporation and of the provincial government and presented with an address and a piece of plate. There were nearly a hundred persons of prominence in military and civil circles. Shortly after 7 the guard of honor supplied by the Royal Canadian Regiment and accompanied by a portion of its band arrived and stationed itself opposite the front of the depot. Sir Arthur and his party reached the station at twenty minutes to 8. Three cars made up the procession. The General occupied the first with his small son, an embryo hero in smart Gungarry uniform and Brigadier General Thacker, G. O. C. As the automobiles passed the guard of honor the men saluted briskly. Upon alighting Sir Arthur spoke to the Hon. J. H. Bell and was introduced to the Lieut. Governor. Accompanied by General Thacker and Col. Hill he inspected the guard. Returning to the platform Sir Arthur sought out the faces of those whom he knew among the onlookers. When Sir Arthur Currie visits Toronto on August 30 he will be attended by a guard of honor every man of which has at least one decoration on the firing line. The Originals Club has been asked to supply the guard of fifty men, two N. C. O's, and two officers and they promise a real surprise for Sir Arthur. All the men in the guard of honor will be First Division men. Sir Arthur Currie is Honorary President of the Originals so they are anxious to provide him a worthy guard of honor.

Cost of War To Great Britain

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Aug. 18.—The war cost forty billion pounds, Premier Lloyd George declared in his speech in the House of Commons today on the financial and industrial situation. Most of this sum was spent for purposes of destruction. The Premier asserted that the changing from war to peace conditions would take just as long as the change from peace to war. The first our standing fact of the present situation was the alarming adverse trade balance. The import restrictions which will terminate September 1st, the Premier continued, had given British manufacturers an opportunity of making goods which otherwise would have been hurried here from foreign countries. HOUSE CROWDED TO HEAR... LONDON, August 18.—Great public interest in Premier Lloyd George's expected declarations on vital labor and economic questions in the House of Commons today attracted large crowds to the House of Parliament. Virtually every member of the House of Commons was in his seat when the speaker took the chair. The lobbies, galleries and the outside courts were crowded when members of the Ministry arrived.
