New Record Established by Sun Life

MONTREAL, February 13—Total payments to policyholders and beneficiaries of more than eighty million dollars were made by the Sun Life of Canada during the year 1944. The Company also established a record by the largest increase of its assets in any one of the 74 years of its existence, the total now standing at one billion, one hundred seventy-nine million dollars. The earnings during the year were very satisfactory and a revision of policyholders' dividends is being made, thereby reducing the cost of insurance on those plans where protection is paramount. In the five-year period the assets increased by 100 million dollars.

In his review of one of the strongest annual statements this leading Canadian life company has released, Arthur B. Wood, President and Managing Director referred to life insurance as an institution which provides for the ultimate burden of the community in its task of providing by means of social security and other assistance in the years to come. The assets of a life company, Mr. Wood emphasized, are huge in total but they represent the accumulated contributions of individual policyholders. Carefully invested and conserved, they provide a new kind of security for themselves and their families.

Highlights In his discussion of the highlights of the Company's annual statement, Mr. Wood said that the increase of \$139 million during the year brought the total assets to \$1,179,446,363, or \$3,312,525,426. The increase of \$139 million had its origin in Canada, 41 per cent in the United States, 21 per cent in Great Britain and other British countries, and 6 per cent in other countries. Referring to the annual branch of the Company's business, he said that the annual income being paid now by the Company totalled over \$10 million and that provision for future income aggregated nearly \$84 million to be paid to individuals or to employees of corporations.

The people of Sarnia and Lambton County have made a name for themselves by their support of public causes. The money has been forthcoming in response to simple straightforward appeals by the Queen's Canadian Fund. The widespread character of a newspaper appeal of this nature is indicated in the circumstances that subscriptions were received by the newspaper from South Orange, N.J.; Hollywood and Long Beach, California; Niagara Falls, N.Y.; besides responses from numerous places including Detroit, Port Huron and Algona in the State of Michigan.

Much ingenuity is displayed in raising money to help the bombed children of Britain. Further valuable reports have been received by the Queen's Canadian Fund from Montreal with letters thanking the people of Canada for their "generous aid to Britain's bombed people," from Adm. Sir Edward Evans, Regional Commissioner for London. One recipient of aid from the Fund writes to the Admiralty: "This gift from Canada came at a time when it was most needed, when our house and home became a total loss and everything we had went in a flash. All we had left was on our backs and at 4.10 in the morning this was not very much. I was under the doctor for 7 weeks, my wife for 5 and daughter for 6. Luckily we escaped more serious injury. "Now—when there is a warning—we are a bundle of nerves. "One cannot live without work and when ones work is in London, we must grin and put up with it. "Please give our grateful thanks to the people of Canada." "I wish to thank you for your prompt and very welcome gift. I lost my home and everything I possessed and buried my husband the next morning after it happened. "Everyone has been very kind to me and I cannot thank the people of Canada enough for this prompt aid."

The letters are warm in their praise for the generosity of Canadian aid.
