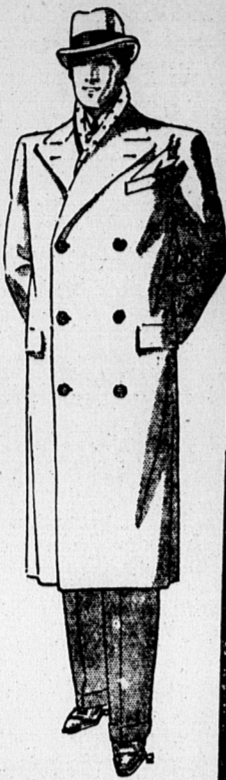

Slight Decline In Unemployment

(Canadian Press)
 OTTAWA Oct. 24—Employment in Canada at the beginning of October showed a slight decline compared with the beginning of September. A comparison with previous years, however, indicated the decline was no more than might be expected owing to seasonal slackening off of opportunities for work. The increase in unemployment during the month of September, therefore, is the normal seasonal increase and indicates no aggravation of the unemployment situation.

The monthly statement compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and based on returns from 7,384 firms shows 1,020,676 persons employed, compared with 1,024,793 at the beginning of the preceding month. This reduction in September is comparable to reductions experienced in the same month throughout the last ten years. The decrease during the same period in 1929 actually involved a larger number of workers although employment last year was in greater volume than this year.
