PLAIN SPEAKING BY LIBERAL JOURNALISTS.

This is a time of plain speaking by a number of Liberal newspapers. For instance, there is the stalwart Moncton Transcript, which is offended with Mr. Brady, Chief Superintendent of the Intercolonial and wants him transferred elsewhere. It speaks right out in meeting in this fashion: "If the Government doesn't transfer Mr. Brady, Mr. Brady and the Board of Management's policy will succeed in transferring the Government from the ministerial to the Opposition benches."

And there is the Liberal Eastern Chronicle of New Glasgow quite fearlessly setting forth that the Government's naval policy should have been submitted to the people before being enacted into law. The Chronicle finds that the Government acted in a "dictatorial" manner and is deservedly rebuked. Says The Chronicle: "As it was, the Government by the manner in which they placed a navy on the Dominion, violated the fundamental principles of responsible government and the Premier's own countrymen have indicted the first spanking—and goodness knows where it will end. The spanking has been severe, but it cannot be said that it was undeserved, and generally, when a Government gets merited chastisement it also gets more of it than it merits."

This and much more of the same kind is, however, coupled with the saving clause that "Taken all in all the Laurier Government has been the best that ever held power in the Dominion."

Then there is Le Pays, a Liberal French Canadian journal, edited by Godfrey Langlois, M.P.P., which in comments upon the Drummond election, laments that the Liberal party in Quebec is seriously ill and has fallen upon evil days. Le Pays says in part:

"Our party has met with a crushing defeat, and we must have the courage to avow it. All will admit that our party is not what it was formerly, for the Liberals have certainly weakened during the past few years. A great number of partisans have raided the depository of the Government, spoilers have wrung from the ministry everything in their power for their own personal account, instead of remaining at their post as good soldiers of duty and progress."

"During all this time they placed their faith as to the future of the party in the splendidly sympathetic personality and the incomparable presence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, upon whose shoulders everything has rested since 1896. As a matter of fact our party is gravely sick. In the minds of a great number of people Liberalism has given place to ministerialism."

"Instead of the grand principles of a former day, we find keen appetites and personal aspirations impregnating the present entourage of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. There are too many people, in fact, who are trying to get rich at the expense of the country. There are too many advocates in Parliament who wish to don the ermine. Our Liberal newspapers instead of being allies of the Government, have been playing the role of servile domestics, and power has been used for the material satisfaction and advantages which it brings."

There is much more of the same sort. Evidently Le Pays is no servile domestic in the Government kitchen and is not afraid to speak its mind. The article concludes with the declaration that the defeat in Drummond-Arthabaska can benefit the Liberal party, if it only knows how to profit by the lesson given, and then with a leader such as Sir Wilfrid Laurier, there are still happy days in store for the Liberals.

The Government will fare none the less for having some candid friends among its newspaper supporters, who have the courage to speak what they think.

think. As a rule party journalism is too much given to indiscriminate and fulsome laudation on the one hand and unsparring denunciation on the other. It is refreshing to note a growing disposition in the press of the country to be more independent in opinion, and more candid in its deliverances. A timely warning now and then may afford better evidence of true friendship than constantly reiterated laudation, and is also entitled to more respect.

The gate ought to be opened for the admission of the State of Maine to the Dominion whenever the people of that interesting border community may desire to join us. The attractive power of the largest territorial area under one government in the New World, filled with splendid resources, is very great.

At this writing the political overturn in the United States elections seems to be very important and significant. We shall know more definitely in a few days whether the new House of Representatives shall or shall not have a Democratic majority. One thing is certain—the high tariff and the great cost of living caused thereby have been potent factors in the contest.

Regrettably the law against the sale of cigarettes and tobacco to boys is grossly and continually violated. This will go on and a certain class of youths will smoke cigarettes until the law is set in motion to check them and to impose penalties on those who sell them the weeds. Some people complain that the liquor prohibition law is not enforced with sufficient energy. A little reflection will show that the same thing is true of many laws, and very notably true of the cigarette law.

Our esteemed contemporary, The Patriot, remarks upon a certain class of newspapers that indulge in fault-finding about railway and winter steamer management. Doubtless the Railway Superintendent and the former Agent of the Marine Department here still retain some pleasant recollections in that regard. But perhaps the average newspaper complains too much. All editors have a host of complaints thrust upon them. It is an amiable weakness to yield thereto once in a while. After all, is not a newspaper in some sort the
