Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The son, head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required in the area where residence is performed in each year. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C.M.G. UNEMPLOYED IN BELGIUM ESTIMATE AT 700,000

Associated Press. PARIS, April 12.—Belgium must have complete reparation if the serious economic situation there is to be improved and Belgian industry is to regain its feet. M. Vanderveelde, Belgian Minister of Justice and Socialist leader, said today in an interview in the Temps. The number of unemployed in Belgium is about 700,000, and the number of persons who have to be assisted by the Government is 230,000. In Brussels, where the normal number of workmen is 20,000, only 26,000 are employed. The textile industry at Verviers generally employs 19,000, but only 700 are working at present.

FEEDING OF RUSSIA ON CONDITION OF CESSATION OF HOSTILITIES

LONDON, April 12.—Herbert Hoover, Director General of the International relief organization, has requested Dr. Fridtjof Nasen head of the Norwegian food mission to the United States to become chief of an international commission to investigate the possibility of feeding Russia on condition of the cessation of hostilities in Russia, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Copenhagen. The despatch says that £10,000,000 monthly will be required for the carrying out of the problem.

INQUIRY METHOD TO PREVENT ALL WARS IN FUTURE

Toronto, April 12.—Insistence on an international inquiry before nations are allowed to fight, and full publicity to the world in general as to why each side wants war, is the biggest feature of "The Paris Constitution," according to Dr. Theodore Marburg, United States Minister to Belgium in 1914-15. He addressed the Empire Club at its luncheon in the King Edward today on this subject. Mr. Richard A. Stapells, President of the club presided.

The distinguished American diplomat was warmly received and before he arose to speak the club sang "God Save the King" and "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

Alliances of Past Failed.

"One knows what public opinion in England is, but I defy anyone to determine what it is in the United States," said Dr. Marburg. "We have greater institutions there than you have in England, but we do not elect men great enough to run them."

Then he turned to "The Paris Constitution." He referred to the leagues and alliances of days past and attributed their failure to the narrowness of those who controlled them. "I regard as the greatest feature of this constitution the insistence on an inquiry before nations are allowed to fight."

"We must take away the license which allows nations to make war at will," said the speaker, who then explained the clause governing international tribunals, which he stated, would be presided over by professional judges, and, like English law, precedent upon precedent would gradually build up international law.

Nations would bring their grievances before this tribunal whose decision no self-respecting nation would refuse to accept, he said.

After the lessons of this war, we expect that a nation would enter into a conflict opposed to progressive powers would be to set no limit on human folly.

"Had Germany known that England alone would have been against her in this war, it would never have been fought," Dr. Marburg declared. He then told of five weeks spent in England in 1914, after the declaration of war, when university professors and powerful newspapers were opposed to Sir Edward Grey's step.

Faith in Publicity.

"But the British people lined up behind that splendid Englishman and the most glorious page of your history has been written," he added, going on to say: "Germany has got to be a member of this league. We have her fleet and we do not intend to let her build another, or replace the guns and equipment yielded to admit her to sow the seeds of another war. She is powerless from a military point of view, and is dependent on the outside world for food and raw material. She has got to abide by the treaty." In closing, the speaker referred to publicity, and declared this would be one of the chief means of preventing future wars.

FOOD SHIPS RETURN WITH BALLAST ONLY

BERLIN, April 12.—The first Entente food ships that reached Germany had to leave in ballast on their return trips because in all Germany there could not be collected enough freight to load them, it is announced in semi-official quarters.

Neither was it possible to recon the steamers completely. The announcement concludes by propounding the question as to how long the Entente will be willing to deliver food under such conditions.

CANADIAN EXPRESS EMPLOYEES ARE ON STRIKE

MONTREAL, April 12.—The employees of the Canadian Express Company struck Thursday evening at 6 p.m. for higher wages and improved working conditions. About 1,200 men in all are affected in this province and the Maritime Provinces in Montreal 175 men are out.

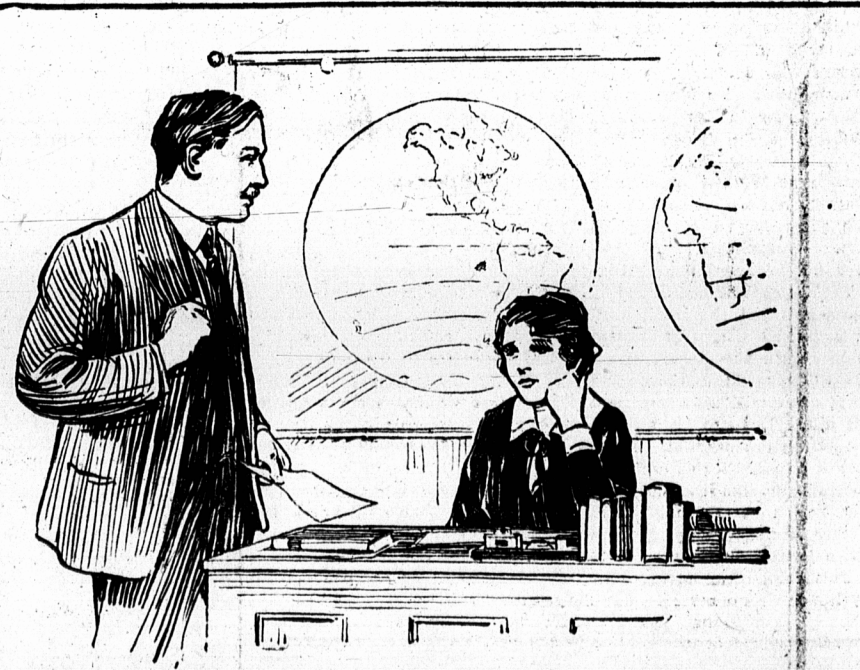
The local employees of the Canadian Express Company went on strike last evening as agreed. As far as Montreal is concerned, it is believed that no difficulty will be experienced by the Company, in keeping on with the business. Men were quickly secured to fill the places of the strikers.

INCREASED PAY FOR POSTAL EMPLOYEES

OTTAWA, April 12.—With written assurances from Hon. N.W. Rowell who acts in the House of Commons for the Postmaster General that the demands for equalization of remuneration as between east and west will be granted by the addition of \$130 to the salaries for 1919 of postal clerks and letters in eastern Canada, representatives of the Dominion Postal clerks' association are leaving for their homes tonight and tomorrow. This will not be given on the monthly pay cheques of the men until after the reclassification of the inside and outside civil service has been completed and brought down in the House of Commons in the course of a few weeks.

POISON GAS TO BE UTILIZED FOR DESTRUCTION OF LARVAE

PARIS, April 12.—Poison gas, that worked such havoc during the war, will be utilized for a very different and beneficent purpose in the future. It is announced in scientific circles, Gabriel Bertrand, of the Pasteur Institute, informed the Academy of Sciences today that he has discovered a method by which such gas might be applied for the destruction of caterpillars and injurious larvae, which had worked destructively on tree growths in the country districts during the past few years.
