Living Costs Show Increase In Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—(CP)—At 84.7 on Oct. 1 as compared with 82.9 Sept. 1, the cost of living index for Canada as compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics showed the greatest monthly gain in more than seven years.

Sharp increases in food prices during the first month of the year, augmented by unusual seasonal advances in fuels and the influx of fruits from the United States contributed to the rise. The food price index moved up to 79.8 from 74.2 between Sept. 1 and Oct. 1 while the index for fuel rose to 85.1 from 83.8.

Priest Succumbs To Injuries

VICTORIA, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Fatally wounded in a hunting accident near 150-Mile House yesterday, Father Edward Moore, well-known Roman Catholic priest in the Carleton Place district, died today, according to radio advices to British Columbia police headquarters here.

Father Moore was hunting with Father John William Hennessey when the accident occurred. As the latter was pulling his gun through a fence by the barrel it discharged, the shot striking Father Moore in the abdomen, the police report said.

Father Moore was formerly a resident of Saint John, N. B.

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Arthur Partridge, general manager of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association, told the annual meeting of the Association of Canadian Advertisers here tonight that during the year, Canada's daily newspapers are in a sense as much vital public utilities as its light, heat and transportation companies.

"They have been and are a bulwark against uncertainty and a bulwark against false rumor and fear," he said. An optimistic picture of the Dominion's reaction was given by Roy Perry, President of the Canadian National Newspaper and Periodicals Association.

"Farmers in Saskatchewan have again found a profitable market for wheat," he said. "Factory towns, Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes, are showing signs of new life. Rail way employees all over Canada realize they are now and will be handling more wheat and more freight, with larger pay envelopes."
