### BELONGING TO A PARTY.

"One thing is true, a great need in our country today is an increase of the number of independent voters. The great body of the electors have come to be little more than recorders of the will of the managers of the party to which they belong. It is high time thinking, self-respecting electors ceased to "belong to any party in the sense of obeying its whip. Their party should belong to them, and from them get its character."

The above is from the Maritime Baptist. Never before were so many newspapers secular and denominational in Canada urging the duty of independence. Ten years ago there were not half so many. And yet how many electors otherwise intelligent there are today who belong to a party in the sense of feeling compelled to vote for its candidates and about its shibboleths and catch phrases, without pausing to consider the absurdity of their position.

Think for a moment. What great principles divide our two political parties today? Corruption is rampant in both. Whiskey and money are used without stint to corrupt the electors, and elections are from time to time stolen on both sides. No party journal any longer attempts to define the principles of its party, except to claim that it is more pure, more honest, more patriotic or economical than the other or that its leaders are more capable than the opposing leaders.

That there are no questions of real principle dividing the two parties is tacitly confessed upon both sides. The parties oppose each other because that is the party game. Otherwise party organizations could not be kept up and electors could not be fooled with party cries and professions. But when it comes to a matter of each Member and Senator grabbing a thousand dollars for himself the party fence is thrown down and the treasury door is thrown wide open.

The closing orle of the last session at Ottawa should sound the death-knell of party in Canada, at least until some question of principle shall arise on which there can be an honest difference of opinion. At present we have two parties, gambling with and for the public treasury, the spoils of power and office. Every intelligent elector knows this to be true. It has ceased to be creditable to "belong to either of our two great parties. The elector ought belong to his country, his family and himself, and held himself free to vote for or against men or measures according to the dictates of his judgment and his conscience. That is true independence.

The Ingersoll merchants and business men have adopted an interesting method of advertising their town. On the backs of the envelopes in which they enclose their out of town correspondence they have printed 24 reasons why that place is one of the most progressive towns in Canada. Included in the list of reasons are a number which are equally applicable to Charlottetown. For instance in population, in water works and fire protection, in shipping trade, in healthfulness of location our city is in advance of Ingersoll. We have enough churches, schools and banks to satisfy all. It would be easy, in fact, to advertise Charlottetown after the manner of the smart little Ontario town, with quite as many good "reasons," and it might be worth while to do so.

### A GREAT CIVIC PAGEANT.

Warwick, a small but ancient town situated on the Avon River is about to celebrate early in July next its 1700 years of history in a great pageant on the beautiful lawn in front of Warwick Castle. It is expected that nearly two thousand persons will take part in the pageant which in the space of two and a half hours will present many scenes of historic interest. The festival will begin with a thanksgiving service in the parish church. Thence adjoining to the Castle lawn, eleven episodes of world wide interest in the story of Warwick Castle and town will be portrayed. These will begin with the Roman invasion of Britain and follow on to the introduction of Christianity, the quarrel between the Kingmaker and Edward IV, the arrival of Queen Elizabeth in her state coach, and the climax will be reached with the introduction of Shakespeare himself in a quite unique situation. The costumes, armor and social peculiarities of the different periods will be faithfully reproduced. The pageant will appeal to all who love ancient and splendid ceremonial. Perhaps if every city had once in awhile a similar representation of its history it might induce a larger interest in the past and a spirit of better citizenship.

The Inland Revenue Department at Ottawa has made an analysis of certain popular patent medicines and has published the results in a bulletin. No man who has been convicted of violating the Scott Act ought to be appointed a vendor or prosecutor under the Prohibitory Law. We mention this because we learn of persons of this class applying for these positions in Prince County. Men who would violate the Canada Temperance Act would not hesitate to do the same with the Prohibitory Law.

Our Mock Parliament was last evening discussing an appropriation of twenty millions for the improvement of the St. Lawrence channel. The real object we presume is to increase the depth of the river channel below Montreal from 27 feet as at present to 30 feet. Is this necessary? London is the greatest port in the world for shipping trade, but the Thames only affords 24 feet at low water. Hamburg, a great German port with twice the population of Montreal, and also situated on a river, is accessible for big ships only at high water when at most 30 feet depth is available. Rotterdam is bigger than Montreal and also a great port but the river channel by which it is approached only gives 22 feet at low water. Antwerp, another great port, is still worse off with a minimum at one point of only 10 feet at low water and a maximum of only 30 feet at high water. Montreal is not badly off in the matter of channel depth as it is.

### COLONEL FLOYD INTERVIEWED

It was the good fortune of a number of Charlottetown citizens to meet that most entertaining of literary cosmopolitans, Col. Robert Mitchell Floyd, during his visit to this province last summer. The Papyrus, a decidedly original "Magazine of individuality," in a late issue has the following to say of the Colonel: Col. Robert Mitchell Floyd, well and tenderly known of the winter in New York within a parasang or two of Union Square—I dare not abuse the Colonel's hospitality by being more specific. The Colonel has sustained the impact of more burn poets, I-have-here-men, world-savers, hierophants, message-men, simple-lifers, psychics and children of the dawn, than any other public character of our time. You'd never think it, either, for Col. Floyd shows no sign of his hair-breadth escapes from the imminent deadly touch:—he is a jovial, handsome, full-blooded man in the contented latitude of fifty, with a real charm of personality and a sweetness of experience quite unsecured by his harassing experiences with the seamy sons of genius. Col. Floyd is intimately identified (too easily identified, he says) with the literary history of the past twenty-five years. It was he who introduced the Canadian twin songsters, Carman and Roberts, to the American public and held them up until their high notes began to take effect. John Jerome Rooney, late laureate of the (Transvaal), reads all his poems in MS. to the Colonel, and the hundred authors of the Pleiades practise their works upon him. I asked the Colonel why he had left Boston, where he has lately resided. His cheerful face dropped for the first time during our little session, and he replied sadly: "No literary atmosphere, my boy, and so I had to quit—you see I'm so used to the company of genius that I must have it, no matter how high it comes." In the departure of Colonel Floyd from Boston the pitying muses weep the final extinction of that once envied literary centre. Bostonia fait.
