**Tony Demers Committed On Murder Charge**

SHERBROOKE, Que., Sept. 29 (CP)—Tony Demers, outwarily showing little interest in proceedings, was committed for trial today on a charge of murdering his girl friend, Mrs. Anita Robert. Hundreds of persons crowded the courtroom and jammed the corridors for preliminary hearings of the Sherbrooke hockey star and former National Hockey League player who the crown claims beat the girl severely. Demers, dressed in a pale gray suit, looked from time to time at the witnesses and occasionally bit his lips. Otherwise he sat unconcernedly in the prisoner's dock. Evidence related to drinking, to marks of injuries on the girl and to her death in La Providence Hospital at Magog where she was taken by Demers several hours before her death. Dr. R. Beaudry of Magog testified that he was called to the hospital Sept. 16. He saw the unconscious woman with cuts and bruises about her head, neck, mouth, hip, legs and feet. Demers then was outside the room to talk to Dr. Beaudry. Demers asked Demers what had happened and Demers replied: "I guess it was a fight." Asked to amplify, Demers said he spent the evening with an unnamed friend. He went out and when he returned he found Mrs. Robert had been injured and was in a bad condition. Demers said the friend asked him to take her to a hospital because the friend was "too well known." Dr. Beaudry said that at the hospital Demers told him: "We would just as soon not have this known and if you don't talk to anyone about it I will give you a good reward." Dr. Beaudry said he performed a lumbar puncture and that some of the fluid removed contained blood, indicating a hemorrhage. He was called again later by the hospital. On his arrival the woman was dead. Dr. Jean-Marie Roussel, medico-legal expert, testified death was "due to hemorrhage caused by blows struck by a blunt instrument, such as a fist." He said he is "not of the opinion" that Mrs. Robert jumped or fell from a car.

**Dodgers Squeeze Into Lead In Hot National League Pennant Race**

(By The Canadian Press) The dauntless Brooklyn Dodgers Thursday squeezed past St. Louis Cardinals into first place in the home stretch of the fierce National League race by defeating Boston Braves 9-2 and 8-0. Coupled with Pittsburgh's second successive defeat of the Cardinals, the Dodgers now lead by half a game, with two to play, both at Philadelphia. The Cards have three games left, all with Chicago Cubs.

**National League Playoffs Arranged**

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—The first of a three-game playoff, if needed, to determine the National League team in the World Series will be played in St. Louis next Tuesday. Representatives of the Brooklyn and St. Louis clubs met today to discuss the National League president, Ford Frick, and made the arrangements. A coin was flipped and Cardinal president Fred Saigh called it correctly over a long distance telephone. Brooklyn, represented by business manager John Collins, thus had the choice. He asked the first game be played in St. Louis on Tuesday. The next two games will be played in Brooklyn Thursday and Friday with Wednesday an open date for travel.

**Former Island Man Heads Arena Building Project**

The initiative and vision of a small group of citizens in Shallow Lake, Ontario, headed by a former P. E. Island man, Mr. Percy Noble, has resulted in the erection of a \$25,000 aluminum-sheathed arena as a memorial to those from the community of 325 citizens who lost their lives during both World Wars. Mr. Noble, now a young business man in Shallow Lake, headed the committee in charge since the arena was first born. He conceived the idea 25 years ago but at that time it got nowhere. The project was started on \$300 left from war fund for the veterans. \$800 more was subscribed at a meeting called by Mr. Noble and grants to the Shallow Lake Legion mounted to \$5000. Another \$5000 was subscribed by the Department of Agriculture and funds were raised through bingo dances. Farmer Shallow Lake men contributed funds and business sacrificed their own time and business to make the project a success. Local labor was supplied free of charge and this saved a great deal of money on the over all price of the construction. In addition to the ice surface the building will house Canadian Legion quarters, dressing rooms, hockey rooms and an office.

**Name All-Star Team To Face Maple Leafs**

MONTREAL, Sept. 29 (CP)—The 18-man All-Star team that will face Toronto Maple Leafs, Stanley Cup winners, was made known here today by the National Hockey League officials, along with a confident statement from coach Hap Day of the Leafs that his team will take a lot of beating. Twelve names of the All-Star squad became known with the selection of the first and second teams after last season's campaign. Coach Tommy Ivan of Detroit Red Wings, who will direct the All-Stars at Toronto Oct. 10, has exercised his privilege of naming six more players. The newcomers are Paul Ronty of Boston Bruins, centre; Tony Leavick of New York Rangers, left wing; and Edgar Laprade and Buddy O'Connor to alternate at right wing on the third line. Ivan became All-Star coach because his Detroit club had more players named to the team than any other and won the N.H.L. championship. The Red Wings lost out to the Leafs in the Stanley Cup final. Since no Leafs were named to the All-Star team, Ivan was not faced with the necessity of naming other players to fill in those positions. His 18-man squad will be made up of five players from Detroit, four from each Montreal Canadiens and New York Rangers, three from Chicago Black Hawks and two from Boston Bruins. After his first victory in three shots at the All-Stars, coach Hap Day said: "They'll have to be good to beat us. We'll show a good team, and I'll guarantee that. We have a good chance this year. We beat ourselves in 1947." It was in 1947, at Toronto, that the All-Stars won 4-3 in a rousing, rugged battle. The Leafs started to bounce the Stars around until such stalwarts as Eulach Bouchard, Milt Schmidt and Ken Reardon met them more than half way and handed it right back. In a less rugged game the Leafs lost 3-1 at Chicago in 1948. Since it has been decided to hold the All-Star game in the home city of the Stanley Cup winners instead of in rotation in the six cities of the league. The No. 1 All-Star team chosen last spring was: Goal, Bill Durran, Montreal Canadiens; defence, Bill Quackenbush and Jack Stewart; Detroit Red Wings; centre, Sid Abel, Detroit; right wing, Maurice Richard, Montreal; left wing, Roy Conacher, Chicago Black Hawks. The No. 2 team: Goal, Chuck Rayner, New York Rangers; defence, Ken Reardon and Glen Harmon, Montreal; centre, Doug Bentley, Chicago; right wing, Gordon Howe, Detroit; left wing, Ted Lindsay, Detroit.

GLACE BAY, N.S., Sept. 28 (CP)—Officials of Glace Bay Miners of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League confirmed tonight that goalie Eddie D'Aoust and winger Jack Thaler are returning to Miners this season.
