

The Existing Fish & Game Legislation

An unofficial consolidation of the Provincial Fish and Game Act and numerous amendments thereto, continued from yesterday's Guardian.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

It shall be the duty of all Constables, Police Officers and Constables of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Market Clerks, to enforce the provisions of this Act, whenever the infringement thereof comes under their notice, under a penalty of not less than Five Dollars (\$5) for each offence.

9. Every common carrier or person acting as a common carrier shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50) or in default of payment to a period not exceeding thirty days in jail, who, at any time hereafter knowingly carries or transports out of the Province any species of game.

10. The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may appoint a Game Inspector and Wardens for the enforcement of the provisions of this Act, at a salary to be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

11. The Game Inspector or any

Constable or Warden is hereby authorized and empowered to seize on sight and confiscate to His Majesty for the uses of the Province:

(a) Any game being exported or attempted to be exported in violation of the provisions of this Act or which there is any reasonable cause to suspect is intended to be exported.

(b) Any game or the eggs of game birds which, during the close season for the class of game so seized, be found in the possession of any person, contrary to the provisions of this Act.

(c) Any lights, lanterns, punts, swivel guns, rifles, spearguns, snares, traps or other things that are found being used in violation of the provisions of this Act.

12. All property seized under the provisions of the previous section, may be held as security for any fine that may be imposed, and in default of payment thereof may be sold after fifteen (15) days notice.

13. The Game Inspector or Constable who has reason to suspect that any game or nest or eggs of game birds is, during the close season for such class of game, concealed or stored in any game bag, box, parcel, wagon, automobile, sleigh or other receptacle, is hereby authorized or empowered to open or cause to be opened, any such receptacle and to search the same, and to seize or confiscate to His Majesty on sight any such game, nest or eggs found therein.

14. All members of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Association, all members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer of each school board in the Province are hereby appointed Game Wardens, without pay, for the enforcement of the provisions of this Act. (Chapter 11, 1944).

15. Every owner of enclosed property is hereby constituted a warden in so far as his own property is concerned. (To Be Continued)

Canada's Oilseed Crops Increase

OTTAWA, Nov. 23 (CP)—The Bureau of Statistics said today a "marked" expansion in acreage occurred in Canada's major oilseed crops this year and, with the exception of flaxseed, all-time production records are indicated.

The 1948 flaxseed crop, estimated at 17,400,000 bushels, is the largest since 1943 and compared with 12,240,800 in 1947.

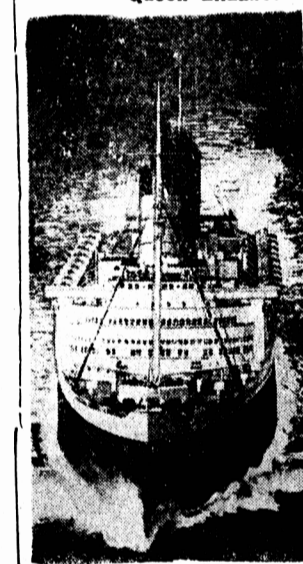
Production of sunflower seed is placed at 22,400,000 pounds, compared with 20,000,000 in 1947, and rapeseed at 85,600,000 pounds, compared with 21,862,000. Commercial production of sunflower seed and rapeseed in 1948 was limited to Manitoba and Saskatchewan, respectively.

Flaxseed acreage was expanded from 1,571,300 acres in 1947 to 1,934,500 in 1948, soy beans from 61,000 acres to 94,000, sunflower seed from 25,000 acres to 28,000, and rapeseed from 58,300 acres to 89,900.

Crew Strikes On Queen Elizabeth



Between 300 and 400 crewmen walked off the liner Queen Elizabeth at Southampton, Eng., an hour before she was to sail claiming they feared reprisals by striking New York dockers if the westward crossings were made.

Delayed three days by the strike, the liner was held up at least another 24 hours by the walk off. Latest reports are that the strikers have agreed to go back to work after the Cunard-White Star Line promised not to sail the liner to the United States until the longshoremen's strike there is settled.

CH'TOWN OFFICIALS TOUR N.B. SCHOOLS — Last week Mayor and representatives of the City School Board and Council of Charlottetown crossed to the New Brunswick mainland to visit the Port Elgin and Moncton High Schools. Dr. Bennett, Director of the Port Elgin region showed the Charlottetown delegates through the newly opened Vocational High School which is to serve Port Elgin (population 900) and surrounding districts with an enrollment of 400 pupils. In the afternoon the delegation drove on to Moncton High School where they were welcomed by Mr. Reginald Spencer, chairman of the Board of Trustees and Mr. Tremble, City School supervisor. A tour was made through the school (present enrollment 1,000 pupils) and the new vocational wing which has been added to serve the increased number of High School pupils (pop. 27,000). The delegates expressed great interest in the cultural and vocational training received by the High School pupils of these two centres. Regular classroom studies are supplemented with instruction in home economics, agriculture, general shop work, wood working, motor mechanics, drafting, electricity etc. Both N.B. schools serve as community centres with their finely equipped auditoriums.
