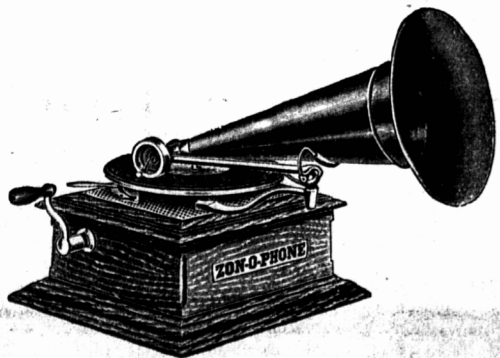

Winnipeg collects \$1,500,000 in city taxes.

According to private letters from San Francisco that stricken city has had several considerable shakes during the month of June, which the newspapers there are concealing by making only the briefest mention.

A British military tailor has been consulted about the uniform of the United States army. The New York Times defends this action. While American citizens dress admirably, the Times says "the American Army is exceedingly ill-dressed and the British army is exceedingly well-dressed."

Jewish banking houses and financiers hold to a large extent the purse-strings of Europe. If the Russian Government is to weather the present storm it must have money. In face of these facts, if Jewish financiers have any soul they ought to be able to prevent further massacres of Jews.

The Washington Post tells that the President and his family keep a frugal table. The regular breakfast is hard-boiled eggs, rolls and coffee. For luncheon, when alone the President has a bowl of bread and milk. If Mrs. Roosevelt and the children are present, they have "cold meat, if any is left over, tea, cantaloup, in season and bread." The dinner nine times out of ten if on three courses and the other time two courses.

Referring to the letter of Dr. Ross, Alberton published in yesterday's Guardian, it would be quite natural to expect that the young men and women who failed to secure diplomas at the P. W. College examinations would be liable to fall in the provincial examinations a week later. This seems to have been what happened. It seems hardly necessary under the circumstances to impugn the examiners or the marking.

President Roosevelt has announced his intention of going to Panama to "see the dirt fly" and have a look at the canal in which he takes intense interest. There is a sort of unwritten law that a President of the United States shall not stray outside of the national boundary during his term of office, but there seems to be no real law or constitutional provision to that effect. In any case the President is a maker of new precedents. The canal is to be built with locks.

Superintendent Sharp and W. S. Poole are reported to leave for Moncton shortly to arrange for two locomotives. No doubt these are needed. We hope at the same time the great need of a parlor car for service between Charlottetown and Summerside will not be overlooked. We are behind the times in this matter—there is no other Province that has not on its railways this prime requisite for comfortable and luxurious travel. It is greatly needed during the tourist season and we feel sure would pay handsomely. We have before referred to this matter several times. It is high time the need was supplied.

Washington desires Ottawa's consent to place a warship, for training purposes, on the great lakes. This, if conceded, would be the entering wedge to large naval expenditures by both nations on inland waters. Better not.

## CAR RAN AMUCK IN LONDON STREET

LONDON, June 28.—One of the worst disasters in the history of electric tramway traction in this country occurred yesterday in the vicinity of the Amous Higgate Archway. One of the Middlesex County Council's splendidly equipped trams got out of control and dashed at fearful speed down an incline. On the way down it crashed into and overturned a funeral coach and finally dashed into a motor omnibus and another electric tram car at the foot of Higgate Hill. The two latter vehicles were crowded with Saturday afternoon excursionists. On the way down the car, which had attained a speed of sixty miles an hour, wrecked a number of small vehicles. The motor bus was smashed to pieces and hurled through a neighboring shop front.

There were extraordinary scenes of panic. The dead and injured were lying about like soldiers on a battlefield. Three persons were killed on the spot and some forty injured. Some of the latter are not expected to recover.

## BRITON'S FISTS BEAT CHINESE

HONG KONG, June 28.—The Amoy correspondent of the South China Morning Post went with a relief party, headed by the British consul, to Tang na gan, the scene of the recent murderous assault on two British subjects. It appears that Dr. Horne, an Australian, and Mr. Forbes Eadie, were walking along near Tang na gan, when a native seized Mr. Eadie's watch. Sixteen Chinamen then suddenly fired on the Britons, who were also attacked with swords. The Britons made a gallant defence with their fists, but were severely wounded. They were found and taken to the American Presbyterian mission, and afterwards conveyed to Amoy. Dr. Horne was dangerously wounded, but is progressing favorably.
