LOSS IN "APPROVED" SHIPMENTS LESS THAN 10 PER CENT

It may seem too good to be true but what really happens for the farmer who buys approved chicks from hatcheries entered under the Hatchery Approval Policy, is in effect that out of every 100 chicks he buys, he gets 16 free, says the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

APPROVED CHICKS

Only such chicks as are normally hatched, conform to a certain minimum weight, and show evidence of good health and vigor, may be sold as "Approved Chicks."
