## PROVINCIAL TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

W. R. Campbell, M. A., Truro,  
Reads Excellent Paper.

## A LESSON ON FERNS.

A Paper on Discipline—Interesting Discussions—The Officers for Ensuing Year.

### FRIDAY MORNING'S SESSION.

Session opened at 9 o'clock, President Campbell in the chair. John McSwain gave a very interesting lesson on Nature Study. He took the fern, having collected a sufficient number of the plants to put a specimen in the hands of each person present. In P. E. I. there are but a few varieties of the fern there being only about 20 species. The habits of the fern were referred to and the differences of character marked.

The first fern mentioned was the showy fern family, there were also mentioned and described the cinnamon fern, platan fern and the royal fern.

Another class was taken up and examined of which specimens were the shield fern, marsh shield fern, wood shield fern, Following these the hay fern, beech fern, oak fern, brake of eagle fern and the sensitive fern. The lesson made clear to the members the method of identifying the fern and will prove helpful to many in their future study of that interesting class of plants.

The lesson was discussed by Dr. McKay. The thanks of the association was conveyed to Mr. McSwain whose response was a happy one.

W. R. Campbell, M. A., of Truro, gave an interesting practical, and profitable address on the subject of Domestic Science.

This paper was discussed by J. D. Seaman, J. A. Ready, C. Kiely, Inspector McIntyre, Mr. Kennedy, and Dr. Taylor. The hearty thanks of the Association was tendered Mr. Campbell in response to which he answered several questions which were asked during the discussion.

Miss Eva Reagh read a paper on Discipline. It claimed that discipline was more important than the classical, etc., part of education, because while the informational part of education may be forgotten the effect of discipline is life-long. Today the child, not the parent rules, displeasure on the part of the child often brings upon the teacher the displeasure of the parent.

As an aid to discipline a good time table which provides occupation all the time for all the pupils, a midsummer vacation instead of the spring and fall vacations when the hot weather tends to make it more difficult to keep pupils interested or orderly. The thanks of the convention was tendered Miss Reagh for her truly excellent paper which owing to the lateness of the hour was not discussed.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention met at 2 o'clock p. m., President Campbell in the chair.

The following resolutions were, after discussion, adopted, viz:—

Resolved that a committee of three be appointed to take such steps as will make the teaching of music more effective in the schools of this Province. Prof. Watts, Ewen Stewart and Miss S. Harris are the committee.

Resolved that the Government be requested to make provision for the teaching of Domestic Science in the schools of this Province.

Resolved that the Government be asked to adopt midsummer holidays for all schools in the Province.

Resolved that in the event of midsummer holidays being granted the next annual meeting of this Association be held in July, 1903.

A resolution was also passed asking the Government to make the pay of male and female teachers the same as obtained in Manitoba and British Columbia.

Resolutions of thanks to Sir Wm. McDonald for the aid given by him towards the furtherance of education in this Province by the establishment of Manual Training schools, and providing the means for a consolidated school and provision for aiding the schools in this Province in the prosecution of Nature Studies.

Also to Prof. James W. Robertson for his untiring efforts in the administration of the Sir Wm. McDonald fund.
