Writes Letter in Polar Region

Montrealer, Who is Spending Winter Among Northern Tribes, Tells His Experiences Which are Most Entertaining and Instructive

MONTREAL, March 22.—A most interesting letter has been received from a Montrealer in the Polar regions, who is spending a winter with the Eskimos and the polar bears, and has written an account of his experiences. He is V. Steffanson, a graduate of Harvard, who was appointed ethnologist of the Anglo-American Polar Expedition commanded by Captain Einar Mikkelsen, which has now reached a point 200 miles off Barrow.

The Amendment Aimed at Club

Came Up For Consideration In Legislature Last Night—Voted Down By Government 18 to 8—Road Bill Put Through

At yesterday morning's session of the Legislature some bills were discussed in Committee and a resolution approving of the proposed telephone cable to be laid underneath Northumberland Straits to connect this Province with the telephone and telegraph systems of the mainland was passed. In the afternoon the House did not meet until between five and six and then there was only time to finish the consideration of the clauses of the Act, then in Committee, to Consolidate and amend the Road Act.

CAPT. KINGSMILL GETS GOOD JOB

LONDON, March 24.—Announcement in the Times today of the death of Henry Kingsmill of Harrowfield, aged 67, has given rise to some misapprehension. It has been recently reported that the captain of the ship "Hesperus" had been followed by the death of Capt. Kingsmill, but Capt. Kingsmill is alive and well. Moreover, he is expected, despite the report, to receive an appointment as captain superintendent of Shearwater dockyard. The admiralty felt bound to reprimand him, as Kingsmill was officially responsible for the action, but it is felt that only nominal blame is attached to him. He did well under very difficult circumstances.

WAR IS ENDED IN HONDURAS

Honduran Forces and Their Allies from Salvador Have Been Defeated

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, March 24.—Santos Ramirez, director general of telegraphs and telephones, today made the following statement to the Associated Press: "The Nicaraguan forces have captured Choluteca, Honduras, which was held by the Honduran and Salvadoran troops, and President Bonilla has fled by boat. "Steamers will pursue the fugitive president. "I believe the war is ended." The government is without further advice concerning the capture of Choluteca, but details are expected shortly. Choluteca is the most strongly fortified town of Honduras. It is on the Choluteca river about 100 miles from the Gulf of Fonseca. It was here, some years ago, that ex-President Yaquez was defeated by allied revolutionists and Nicaraguans.

ACCIDENT TO BATTLE LINER

HALIFAX, March 25.—The Battle Line S.S. Plateau, Capt. Parker from London for New York put in here this morning short of coal. The Plateau left London on March 21 and encountered a succession of gales all the way out. When sixty miles south of Cape Breton the vessel was met and in forcing her way through it the Plateau struck some of her plates which caused the ship to leak in the forepeak. A survey will be held to ascertain the damage. The Plateau will take fifty tons of coal.

FAMINE IN CHINA CAUSES ALARM

WASHINGTON, March 24.—From Shanghai advices received at the state department it appears that the ruling dynasty in China is seriously alarmed over the effect of the famine through the country and the opportunity it offers to seditionary societies to enlist converts to the cause of revolt against the Government. The suffering of the people is used as a pretext for the person given assistance under obligations to the state.

TOLD ABOUT THE KAISER'S SHIPS

BERLIN, March 22.—At the express wish of the Kaiser, I am told on excellent authority, the minister of justice is endeavoring to find some law under which Count Reventlow, the famous naval critic, may be punished for his recent disclosures of the weakness of Germany's naval strength. The Count, who for years has been a very productive writer in the daily press, as well as in technical magazines, and who is recognized the world over as a naval expert, committed high treason, in the opinion of the Kaiser, when in a recent article he made the statement that the fleet has been greatly reduced by the French Jingo press, that under no conditions does Germany even think of war with a first-class power until 1910 because most of her battleships are floating coffins of the same kind as Russia's famous Baltic squadron destroyed by the Japanese in the Straits of Tsushima.

ENLARGING ASSOUAN DAM

Cairo, March 22.—The Council of Ministers has adopted the proposal to raise the Assouan dam. The extra supply of water thus obtained will be sufficient to irrigate a million acres of land. About 600,000 acres, mainly Government property, which is now unutilized because there is no water for the purpose, will be brought under cultivation. It is estimated that the annual output will be nearly 300,000,000. The work will be completed in 1918.
