Definite Break In Baptist Church In Near Future

TORONTO, Jan. 20.—Predictions that in the near future there will be a definite split in the Baptist denomination in Canada are made today as an aftermath of the action of the Ossington Avenue Baptist congregation Sunday night in dismissing its pastor, Rev. G. W. Allen.

Mr. Allen is a fundamentalist and a supporter of Rev. Dr. T. T. Shields in his attacks on McMaster University and on Prof. L. H. Marshall, the English professor recently brought out to join the McMaster faculty.

Signs of the split that is prophesied are said to be well manifested already. Some of the churches which are distinctly fundamentalist have cut off their financial support to McMaster and are threatening to contribute no more to certain of the other denominational churches. Jarvis street church, where Dr. Shields is pastor, some time ago ceased to help McMaster financially and has also cut off its support to the Baptist missions in western Canada, alleging as a reason that some of the professors in the Brandon Baptist college are not orthodox in their beliefs and teachings.

One Baptist seized up the situation in these words: "The State of affairs is such that the split must come. The Shields supporters will cut off or be cut off from the Baptist body and no doubt will establish a connection of their own. As it is now they withdraw support from general Baptist enterprises and funds and at the same time try to control them."

There are two ways in which the challenge may come to a head and result in an open split, according to certain Baptist authorities. It may be at the next meeting of the Toronto Association of Baptist churches, which is to be held in the spring. It is said that then it may be decided to withdraw the hand of fellowship from Jarvis street church and its pastor.

The other way is that at the next convention of Baptists of Ontario and Quebec there may be a refusal to seat the delegates from Jarvis street church, and this would automatically bring about a schism in the church out of the fellowship of the Baptist churches.

Interesting Letter From Missionary In China
Following are extracts from a letter received by Rev. Robert Murray of Hillsboro, N. S., from his daughter Dr. Florence Murray, who was designated as missionary to Korea by Zion Church of this city.
Hamhung, Korea, Nov. 11, 1925.

I had a good trip up from Seoul, considering it was the usual thing of lying in a cramped position in a seat, till I got sore, and stiff, then waking up and stretching, and going to sleep again. The Japanese have a strong aversion to fresh air and so one never is allowed to get any on a night train. Some one objects to the conductor, and he makes you shut your window, if you persist in keeping it open. Of course every one else smokes, but you are expected to enjoy that. On arriving at station I found Hamhung jammed with people, and all the hospital staff but the Biblewomen, and one male nurse at the station to conduct me in state to the hospital.

The Wonsan doctor had left the day before, the other one had gone to the Hongwon clinic, there was a great holiday on in the city, and so all the hospital folk got off for the occasion. There is an exhibition going on, and it is said to be very good indeed. Thousands of people are everywhere, having come in from all over the country, to see the exhibition, and all the sights of the provincial capital. The churches are holding prayer meetings at five o'clock in the morning, and also every evening, while many of the church people are distributing tracts, and preaching. They have a tent in one place, and many are going in and listening to the preaching. All the Biblewomen are out among the women, and in church on Sunday there were some believers, while there are good attendances at the evening meetings in the churches. Surely there will be some harvest from all this sowing.

I was so busy jumping into work again I did not get my suitcase unpacked for two days, and I have not yet got my things put away. Miss MacCully is doing well, and Mr. Young is better. I am just home from Hongwon tonight. The train this morning was so jammed it was hard to get a seat. There were three men sitting with me, and no woman very near so I decided it would be proper and maidenly of me not to make myself too conspicuous. I had some papers that had come while I was away and set about reading them. One of the men was much interested and said to his companion, "what do you suppose she is reading? What language is that anyway, I never saw a newspaper like that before." After a while he began again, and finally he asked me what I was reading. I told him, and he was evidently pleased with his discovery for, turning round in his seat he called out to all in his vicinity, "Come and see her talk to her, ask her questions, she can talk to you." And a good many availed themselves of the opportunity.

They were on their way home from the exhibition, and I suppose they thought they might as well have one more side show, especially as it was free. They all had a good look and I was asked where I came from, and how long ago, what language I spoke, and how old I was. So when I got my luggage I had some questions too, and asked them if they were Christians, (Continued on Page 8)
