GONE TO OTTAWA—Sir Louis H. Davies, K. C. M. G., P. C., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, received a telegram Saturday night, recalling him to Ottawa, and he left yesterday morning for the capital. Sir Louis is to be acting Governor General during the absence of His Excellency the Governor General who is making a summer tour in the Gulf. He is expected to return in time for the entertainment to the Prince of Wales here.

While the game is in progress on Wednesday evening ballots will be passed around to the spectators to allow them to select what they consider the strongest nine from the eighteen players on the field to meet our Maritime neighbors. In this way it is hoped to produce the strongest non-partisan team it is possible to secure in the city.

## Export of Hides Is Prohibited

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—The Minister of Trade and Commerce announces that owing to the abnormal situation of the Hide and Leather Market, which vitally affects the interests of both consumers and producers of skins and shoes in Canada, the Government has called a conference of parties interested to consider and advise as to the best course to be pursued. In the meantime it is deemed wise as a preliminary measure to place the export of hides, skins and leather under control. An order in council has therefore been passed and is now operative to the effect that pending consideration of other necessary action the exportation from Canada of rawhides, skins and leather for the manufacture of boots and shoes shall be prohibited, except under license from the Canadian Trade Commission.

## Convention of Churches of Christ

The Friday morning session of the convention held at Montague, was characterized chiefly by two splendid addresses, one by Evangelist L. E. Sellers of Indiana on "Personal Evangelism," and one by Mr. Harding of Summerside on "Retrospect and Prospect." Mr. Sellers impressed the need of more personal work and illustrated from experiences the great advantages accruing from such work on the part of every Christian. Mr. Harding's address was a survey of past work for half a century and a practical consideration of the problems confronting us for future days. The afternoon session was given over to the work of the W. M. S. At 8 o'clock Mrs. Ellie K. Payne gave a soul-stirring, uplifting address on the needs and work on the foreign field.

The session on Friday morning was taken up mainly with the general routine of business. The reports from the various churches were satisfactory and encouraging, and showed marked gains in membership, and also increase in offerings for both home and foreign work. The following resolutions were submitted and adopted:  
1. Resolved that the warmest thanks of this convention be tendered to the church and people of Montague for the abundant hospitality extended to the delegates, which is the source of so much pleasure to all attending the annual gathering.  
2. That this convention express its appreciation of the presence and helpful service given by Mrs. Payne and Bros. Corey and Sellers of United States.
