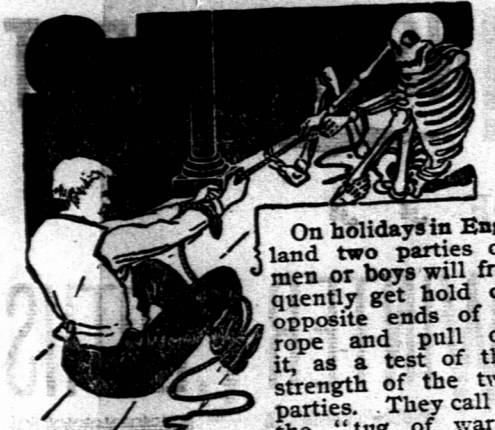

THE BOER MAUSERS.

It is said that South African Forces will be better Armed than British.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Comment regarding the personnel and material of the British force, which is expected to be fighting within a short time in South Africa, continues to occupy a large share of public attention. Many criticisms appear, blaming the Government for not permitting the War Office months ago to put an adequate defensive force on the probable scene of action. But the rumors of the forthcoming departure of an army corps somewhat appease these critics. It is almost certain Gen. Sir Redvers Henry Buller, the former adjutant-general, will have supreme command in South

Africa. In the meantime, the military responsibility is divided between Major-General Sir George Stewart White and Lieutenant-General Sir Frederick William Forester-Walker, the latter at the Cape and the former in Natal, each being supreme over his own district.

General White, who is described as a fighting man, "keen as mustard," has not yet arrived in Natal. Upon him will devolve the duty of checking any desultory Boer raids, or, in case of a premature outbreak of actual hostilities, of holding Natal until Gen. Buller's army corps arrives, when the aggressive British campaign will probably occur. Some dissatisfaction is expressed because Gen. White has never served in South Africa. But it is generally thought that his fighting abilities will more than make up for his lack of topographical knowledge. Under Gen. White and Walker will be a host of officers specially selected for their knowledge of Boer methods and South African campaigning.

Gen. Sir William Symons, Gen. White's second in command, is one of the few survivors of the massacre of Isandlwana. The artillery, in Natal, will be commanded by Col. Downing, late chief instructor at the school of gunnery, Shoeburyness, who has the highest scientific and practical reputation. Major-General French, commanding the cavalry, is a dashing officer, somewhat on the lines of an American officer. Gen. Young served through the early Egyptian campaign.

Much has been said regarding the physical fitness of a large percentage of the British rank and file going to South Africa or already there. A great difference of opinion on the subject exists. But it can be said that their regiments selected are believed to have the highest standard of physique and all are comparatively long service men.

Many of the British officers believe the Mauter, with which the Boers are armed, is superior to the Lee-Metford rifle of the British for use against civilized troops. A small arms expert said to a reporter of the Associated Press: "The Lee-Metford will stop savages, but that is no the object most desirable when fighting against civilized forces. Under a well managed Mauter fire troops will come, dropping gradually from the effect of galling wounds and not realizing the necessity of cover or retreat until when within the deadly zone, they find half their number disabled and unable to face the full weight of short range fire. In other words, Mauter-armed troops are more deceptive to the enemy than those armed with Lee-Metfords, the effect of the latter being immediately visible to the officer directing the fight." The Indian and Australian horses, which will be much used by the cavalry and mounted infantry, will probably suffer more from the change of country than the men, being obliged to live on cats and weasels, a form of fodder they are utterly unaccustomed to.

The apparent inclination of the Secretary of State for War, the Marquis of Lansdowne, to run the campaign preparations on his own idea, and his tendency to consult subordinate officers, have called forth a published reminder that he has a capable commander-in-chief at his elbow.

TRADE IN THE EAST

Sir Chas. Dilke Discusses

Relative Positions of

ENGLAND AND AMERICA

And says that English and American Interests Should not Clash.

Sir Charles Dilke, in the North American Review for October, discusses the relative positions and prospects of America and England in the east. He does not think that there is a probability that American and British interests will ever clash in that region, but for the present they should unite in the effort to prevent power that seek territorial concessions in China from shutting up that ancient empire to the free commerce of the world. Of America's interest in the east, Sir Charles says:

"What do we mean by the growing mercantile interests of the United States in the far east? by the intermingling of those interests with British interests, and by the suggested fear that these interests may one day clash? The producers of the United States, with an unrivalled combination of coal, the metals, invention and skilled labor at their back, will need to send their produce to customers in other portions of the world. The United States will undoubtedly want to send steel and machinery, as well as many other commodities that might be mentioned, to India and to China, and to receive from India and China and Ceylon tea and silk and other articles which the territory of the United States

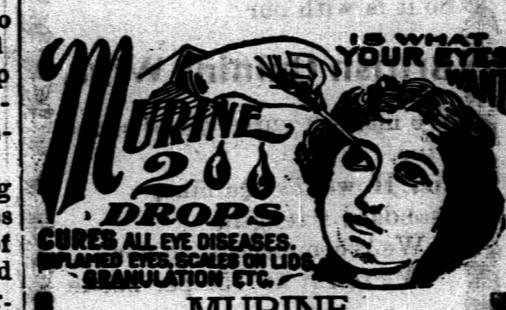

CHANGE IN FAITH

Rev. C.E. Trudel Expounds

His Views.

NOT AN APOSTATE.

Formerly a Roman Catholic Priest—Now a Minister in the Presb. Church.

MONTREAL, Sept. 3.—The Rev. C. E. Trudel, a former Roman Catholic clergyman, who has joined the Presbyterian Church, preached Sunday evening at the Church of St. John, corner Cadieux and St. Catherine streets. He repudiated the terms ex-priest and apostate, saying that the sacerdotal consecration performed upon him twenty-three years ago left an indelible impression. The mere fact of going from one church to the other was not apostasy. In order to become a renegade one must needs abandon the Lord, as did Julian the Apostate. It was through deep conviction and after carefully reading the Bible and consulting with pious people that he resolved to secede from the Church of Rome. As to his profession of faith, it was embodied in the common creed. He believed in the Bible as containing the inspired word of God, and professed that man was justified in faith only, and not by his labours or virtues. When admitted as a minister, six months hence, he should be happy to sign the Westminster Confession of Faith. Everyone should read the Bible and make efforts towards being good Christians. The object of man's life should not be to make Protestants, but to make better Christians of all men. Good example was also needed, and he felt bound to say that he always had been edified at the great charity existing in Protestant families with which he had recently come in contact. He concluded by laying great stress upon the necessity of reading the gospels and thanking such clergymen as helped him in his new career.
