THE TARIFF HAS NOT BEEN THE CAUSE OF THE WESTERN FARMERS' TROUBLES

The improvement in business conditions in the West recently has demonstrated the soundness of the Liberal-Conservative party's contention that the tariff has not been the cause of the troubles of the prairie farmer in the past. The trouble lay in the fact that wheat prices were too low; that is they were out of line with the prices of other products generally.

A change has suddenly come over the situation. Why? Because the price of wheat has soared. Every farmer knows this. He also knows by this time that the talk about heavy oppression of the Tariff has been nonsense. Confronted by the fact that the estimated value of this year's grain crop is \$72,000,000 the second most valuable crop in the history of the country, the western farmer cannot but be convinced that the tariff has been, pretty much a False Alarm.

The tariff has had no more to do with this greatly improved condition of things than the King of Come about through conditions over which neither the Government of this nor any of any other country, has had the slightest control. Providence has given our farmers 300,000,000 of wheat at a time when a number of other countries are short of their usual supply. This, and this alone, has made the difference.

These facts, which cannot be denied, show plainly that the Liberal-Conservative party has been sound in its tariff policy. They show also that the Liberals and Progressives in bringing the change

**CHARGED WITH SALEM MURDER**

SALEM, Mass., Oct. 15—Mrs. Marion A. Risteen, of Beverly and George Plummer, Jr., a judge at her home, were arraigned in district court here today, on charge of first degree murder in connection with the death of the woman's husband, Fred Risteen, formerly of Hampton, N. S., whose body was found in Norwood Pond, North Beverly, on October 4. The date of Risteen's death has been placed at September 21.

In voices hardly audible in the court room both entered pleas of not guilty. Mrs. Risteen collapsed as she uttered the words, "not guilty" and was assisted by a police officer. Plummer made an attempt to smile when his name was called.

On motion of their counsel the case was continued for a week and defendants remanded to jail without bail. Risteen's body was discovered by three boys, one of these Plummer's little brother. It had been weighted down with automobile parts and pieces of metal. In a confession Plummer said he had killed the man in a fair fight after Risteen had accused him of familiarity with Mrs. Risteen. 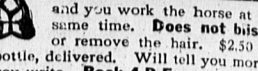

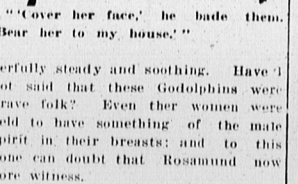
**CHAPTER XIX THE TRUTH**
