THE REPRISALS OF FRANCE FOR HUN FINES.

PARIS, August 30.—The question has been raised in official circles what the French Government should do in the way of reprisals for enforced subscriptions to German war loans from properties of French citizens which have been sequestered in Germany. One example cited is the case of M. Haefle, proprietor of spinning mills at Gebweiler, in Alsace. M. Haefle is a French citizen. He departed with the French army upon its retirement in August of last year.

The official German receiver of his property is said to have subscribed 100,000 marks (\$25,000) to the first German loan, placing it against the personal property of M. Haefle and an additional 500,000 marks against the spinning mills. When the second war loan was raised the receiver is said to have subscribed 300,000 marks more, placing it in an obligation upon the mills, notwithstanding the fact that two-thirds of the shares of the company owning the mills are held in France.

ROOSEVELT HAS CAUSED RUMPUSS

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Aug. 29.—General Leonard Wood last night declined to comment on the telegram he received from Secretary of War Garrison in connection with the address of Theodore Roosevelt, delivered here Wednesday night.

"I have received instructions from the secretary of war," he said, "to allow no addresses to be made in these camps except on subjects directly affecting the technical military training and, of course these instructions will be rigidly complied with."

R. M. SCHURMAN INTERVIEWED REPLIES TO THE PATRIOT

The Patriot is leaving no stone unturned these days in the effort to make political capital, and in doing so it is not particular as to the methods employed or who suffers. Its latest victim is Mr. Major Schurman, one of the stalwart Liberals of Prince County, who has several building contracts in Charlottetown, and has a number of men employed. It is charged, among other things, that Mr. Schurman employs cheap outside labor and that he is crowding out the Charlottetown workman who has to walk the streets. The Guardian has no desire to interfere in the quarrel between the leading Liberal organ and a prominent Liberal like Mr. Schurman. Its one desire is that the facts be properly presented.

"I have fourteen from Charlottetown, five from Amherst, three from Summerside, two from Kensington, two from Egmont Bay, and one from Rustico. I do not know where the others come from." "Is it a fact, as charged in The Patriot, that you employ cheap labor?" "Well, here's my pay sheet. You can see for yourself. This pay sheet, as you see, shows that I pay three men \$5.00 per day each, one man \$4.00, three men \$3.50, two men \$3.00, five men \$2.50, and all laborers \$2.00 per day each." "These wages look high for Charlottetown."

"I always employ good men and pay the highest wages. I find that it pays in the end." "Can you get all the men you need in Charlottetown?" "No, I am now looking for four good hardwood finishers, and cannot get them here. I know also of two other contractors who are looking for good men and cannot get them."

"Do you buy your lumber here?" "Yes, I buy all my rough lumber from Mr. Paoli, where I can always secure good stock, and get prompt delivery." "Where do you buy your manufactured stock?" "Principally in Toronto." "Why do you not buy here?" "The mills are all taxed to their fullest capacity and cannot supply the goods."

"Would there not be an opening here for a good wood-working factory?" "I do not know of a better opening anywhere than there is here. Such a factory, well conducted, should pay large dividends, and be a great benefit to the community."

"Do you think the men you have brought to Charlottetown have been a benefit to the place?" "I am sure they have. Some of them have already rented houses and moved their families here. Others not only pay their board in Charlottetown but buy their home supplies here."

"They say you have \$50,000 worth of work in Charlottetown?" "That's about as near to the truth as the other statements made in The Patriot. My contracts do not amount to more than half that sum." "What is your opinion with regard to the tax on outside labor that is spoken about in The Patriot?" "I think it would be a great mistake for any civic or provincial government to impose such a tax. It undoubtedly would be against the best interests of the community."

This closed the interview, and after thanking Mr. Schurman for his courtesy The Guardian man withdrew.
