**National League Is Better Balanced**  
NEW YORK, May 9.—The baseball season has gone far enough to give a good idea as to the relative strength of the National League clubs. A week or two of baseball play does not make a season any more than one robin makes a Summer. But the expert eye can get a pretty close line on the playing of the individual clubs after they have crossed bats a few times. Each of the National League four Eastern clubs have now engaged each of its three Eastern rivals in at least one game. The ensuing results appear to indicate a nicer balance and a more even distribution of strength than has been the case in several seasons. For the present it looks no Eastern club outclasses its neighbor so far as to dominate the field, and none of them is so weak that any of the others can afford to toy with it.  
The Giants thus far have proved a disappointment. In no sense have they measured up to the standard of preseason press notices. The Brooklyn Robins, the Phillies, and the Boston Braves, on the other hand have all exceeded the expectations of their supporters. While the Braves and the Phillies may be traveling a bit beyond their speed at present, they showed unexpected strength with promise of its continuance. All three have been strengthened where they most required it, and are playing better ball this Spring than at a corresponding period last year, because they have better material with which to play it.  
Only the Giants have failed to improve, or rather have failed to show improvement, for expert opinion is still unanimous that the New York club, which now runs its potentiality 20 percent stronger than the one with which he began last season. Once the Giants get under way they will make life difficult for all opponents.

**Second Car Ferry Absolutely Necessary**

ferry should leave her route and come to the rescue of those ships. For the car ferry to undertake such service would be a convenience, as it would completely tie up traffic between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. If I am not properly informed and do not properly apprehend the meaning and intention of this appropriation, I shall be pleased if the minister will put me right.  
MR. BALLANTYNE: The icebreaker will be used primarily for the breaking of ice in the St. Lawrence at the end of the season and towards the opening of navigation. It will also keep the icebreaker at Cap Rouge. It will be so powerful that it will be able to go to the assistance of ocean vessels leaving Montreal or Quebec late in the season. Last year, as the hon. member says, two of the Government steamers got stuck in the ice, and if we had had an icebreaker, there would have been no difficulty whatever in at once rescuing both these steamers from the ice pack in which they found themselves.  
The leader of the Opposition (Mr. MacKenzie King) the other evening once again took into the question of having the icebreaker constructed that it would also serve as a car ferry. I do not know whether that is possible or not, but as I promised my hon. friend, the other evening, I shall take technical advice on the point when tenders are being called for. I cannot make any more definite statement at the moment. I know that all hon. members realize the importance of navigation on the St. Lawrence and on our east coast of having an icebreaker of this great strength. We only have two icebreakers at the present time, the Montcalm and the Lady Grey, neither of which is strong enough to cope with thick ice at certain seasons of the year. During the war an icebreaker similar to the one we are going to have constructed was sold to the Russian Government by the Earl Grey and the Minto were also sold, leaving us with only the Montcalm and the Lady Grey.  
MR. MACKENZIE KING: Inasmuch as I made the suggestion the other evening to which the minister has been kind enough to refer, I should like to say just a further word in regard to it. As the minister is aware, there is at the present time simply one car ferry between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. Since that car ferry has come into use the people on the island have become dependent on it to a degree that is almost excessive. This result is that if anything happens to that ferry at any moment, the island will be shut off and there will not be available the variety of smaller craft that there would have been before people had come to rely so much on this car ferry. It is generally felt on the island that there ought to be two car ferries, because if anything happens to the present one the people would be left without the accommodation to which they have become accustomed, and at certain seasons of the year that might prove very embarrassing indeed. It was for that reason that I asked the minister to consider, at the time this great icebreaker is being constructed, whether it would not be possible to have it so designed that in off seasons and in time of emergency it might be used to ac-

form. Under George Gibson they are playing well together and in the series with the League champions last week they looked good enough to make a distinctly favorable impression on the critics of the porpoises.  
The Chicago Cubs and the St. Louis Cardinals have not done as well. The latter have good hitting power and some speed, but their pitching staff is uncertain and shows little promise of improvement. The Cubs are in even worse plight, for they have limited batting power to offset the weakness of their hurling staff.  
It would appear, therefore, that the Eastern clubs will find the going hardest at Pittsburgh and Cincinnati when they invade the West in May. Cincinnati rarely fails to start well, but Pittsburgh has been accustomed to getting away on the going foot. This year, however, their play has been apparent from the start.  
Despite the reverses suffered by the Giants, Eastern critics are practically unanimous in selecting them as the class of the East. The only dissenting opinion comes from Brooklyn. The going is usually easy for the Giants while playing in the East, but they usually strike some kind of a snag in the West. This year, however, they have not found the going in the East as soft as usual. They will have to reverse their record in the West to climb within a striking distance of the top. When they do that they can be considered worthy opponents of the three other clubs in the East.
