THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.

LONDON Oct. 3.—(Special).—Up to 3.30 p. m. the members elected were Conservatives 161; Unionists 29; Liberals 30 Nationalists 27; total 256.

Of these 190 are supporters of the Government and 66 Opposition.

Twelve men escaped, but the fate of the others is unknown.

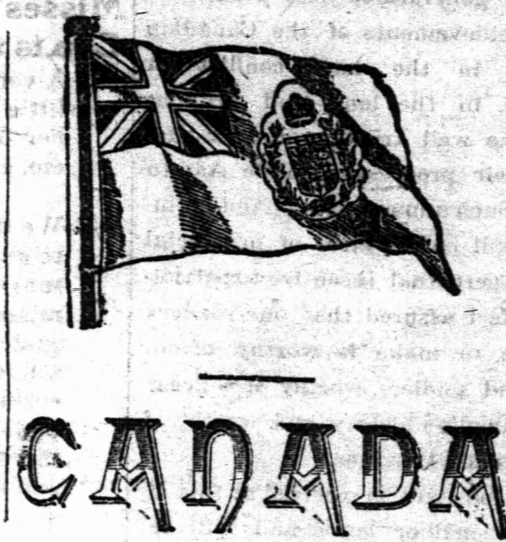

PREMIER FARQUHARSON'S LETTER.

PREMIER'S OFFICE, Charlottetown, Oct. 3, 1900.

To The Editor of THE GUARDIAN: DEAR SIR,—Referring to our conversation this afternoon in reference to a monument being erected in our city to the memory of Riggs and Taylor, who gave up their lives for their country in South Africa, I desire to say that I am in thorough accord with the movement.

Anything therefore that I can do to assist this noble undertaking will be done with pleasure. We are living amongst an intensely loyal people, who I know will respond to this call. I desire to thank you for leading off as you are doing in this good work.

COL. MOORE'S LETTER.

To The Editor of THE GUARDIAN: SIR,—I have heard with pleasure that a movement is to be inaugurated to pro-

vide a monument to commemorate the heroism of the two noble "Soldiers of the Queen" from this Province, who laid down their lives while manfully fighting the Empire's foes on the blood stained field of Paarlberg, South Africa.

The names of Alfred Riggs and Roland Taylor should never be forgotten. They will live in the hearts of the present generation who will ever cherish the memory of their heroic sacrifice.

We should show our appreciation in a tangible way by erecting a monument on one of our public squares, which would tell to generations to come of the noble deeds of our brave boys.

While we should pay special honor to the memory of the dead, we must not forget the obligation we are under to the brave fellows who have fought battle after battle and endured hardships, privations, and hunger, and who are so soon to return to receive a hearty welcome home. Should not the name of each one of the forty-eight heroes who left our shores for the field of strife be placed where they may be pointed out to our children's children as the men who in this hour of their country's need bravely enrolled as defenders of their country's flag and bravely fought her battles among the kopjes of South Africa.

SOUSA'S ENCORES

Bandmaster Again Plays in New York.

METROPOLITAN OPERA

House Filled to Hear "America's Sousa" as a Conductor—His Curves.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2nd.—A crowd large enough to fill the Metropolitan Opera House braved the rain storm last evening by turning out to hear Sousa's Band performing Sousa's marches and incidentally other selections.

It was the sort of house that gives joy to the man in the box-office on account of its size, and helps the Band along to unusual exertions because of its enthusiasm.

Sousa has come to be regarded as a sort of national possession, like the bald headed eagle which he in one respect resembles, or the ragtime melody which is, like Sousa, an exclusively American production.

Sousa as a conductor was last night as full of curves and winding anaconda-like undulations as ever, and, when in full swing, looked quite like the many caricatures that have been published of him. He was framed in by a stage set with trophies in the shape of banners from some of the countries he visited last Summer, the chief places being given to the royal standard of Austria-Hungary and to the Free flag.

As usual with Sousa's performance, there were twice as many encores given as there were numbers on the programme, but they were all rendered cheerfully. Some of the repeats were in the comedy line and got hearty laughs, while the majority were old and well known Sousa compositions. His new march, "Hail to the Spirit of Liberty," was encored several times.

Herbert L. Clarke, who can tease a cornet until it emits music that is really as sweet and delightful to the ear as that from any of the more easily domesticated instruments, rendered one of his own compositions, "Bride of the Waves," so effectively that he was called back twice, playing "The Holy City" the first time, and after that "Darling Sue." He did the latter in a way that showed he can be light and graceful with his instrument as easily as he can do heavy tragedy.
