All the farmers present subscribed to the usual declaration and the following committee was appointed to canvas the district thoroughly and report at an adjourned meeting to be held at St. Eleanors on Wednesday, the 10th inst.: Wm. McGregor, George Compton, Wm. Andrew, C. R. Dickie, Danl. Campbell, Thomas Gaudet, John Hall, Major Linkletter.

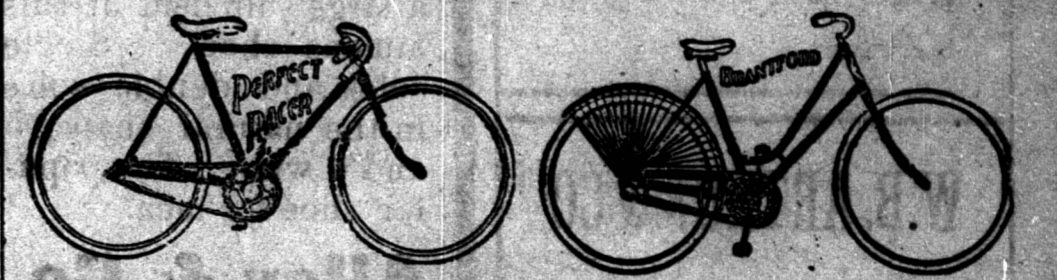

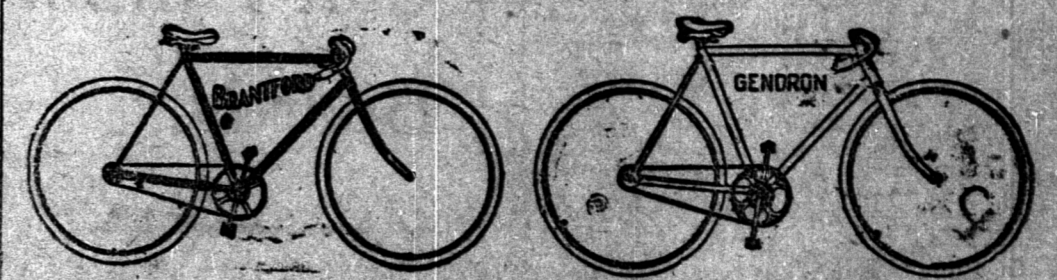
