MR. WYATT began with a graceful compliment to the Speaker. He created some amusement by reading a newspaper report of a meeting at Morell at which Mr. Cox, now so confident of his success, had moved a resolution to the effect that the meeting was not competent to express an opinion on the subsidy question. (Mr. Cox denied that this had occurred.) Mr. Wyatt said the honorable member had apparently lost his memory along with his modesty. (Laughter) After discussing his election in Summerside, of which he was proud Mr. Wyatt came to the Tunnel. He was surprised to find the Premier throwing cold water on the project and acting as the apologist of the Government at Ottawa. He cited Sir Douglas Fox's report and the statements of Capt. Read, and asked why the Premier should represent the Tunnel as an almost impossible work? He argued at length the advantages the Tunnel would give. Coming to the fishery claim he reviewed the Washington treaty, the Halifax award, and argued that the inshore fisheries were entirely our own and we were as much entitled as Newfoundland to our separate share of the award. He asked, if our claim is indisputable why is it not collected? Under Premier Peters this claim was set down at \$1,250,000. Later after the claim had been dangled for years before the people Premier Peters on return from Ottawa said it was found we had no legal claim. At the close of Mr. Wyatt's speech the House went into committee, Mr. McWilliams in the chair. Three paragraphs were passed. The fourth paragraph referred to claims. MR. DOBIE--A business man wants to know how he stands. The Province owes a million dollars. What have we to offset this? He argued that the Tunnel, the Premier could not take the third steamship could not take the place of the Tunnel. We asked for it to help over our difficulties till the Tunnel is built. He moved an amendment to the fourth paragraph of the address, seconded by Mr. Mathieson to add: "That it is doubly to be regretted that a sufficient increase of subsidy has not been requested to enable the taxation on the farmers to be abolished."

MR. MATHIESON moved the adjournment of the debate and the House adjourned till tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

Government is willing to give us just just dues evidently do not want it. If the Tunnel survey was a "bogus" one why was not a genuine survey made? He reviewed the Bedeque election, which he affirmed was dishonestly decided by the returning officer. He hoped the Infirmary had been honestly built, but if so it was an exception to the Asylum, the P. W. College, and the Summerside Court House. Scarcely a dollar was spent on the roads all summer till just before the election. Then new roads were opened and old ones repaired. It looked suspicious. The county exhibitions were a good thing, but had been forced on the Government which was entitled to no credit. The same with agricultural education. We send young farmers to Truro because opportunities they formerly had at home no longer exist. At 6 o'clock the House adjourned till 8.

MR. MCKINNON resumed his speech, discussing our claims for better and cheaper transportation. The Government party had indeed made one effort toward a change. They combined to oust the Superintendent of the Railway with the result that he was continued in office and his salary increased. Beyond this nothing was done. We had once a splendid Stock Farm. It was allowed to run down to a milk station, and last and lowest to growing oats for sale.
