Todd won two firsts, the classes in which he so successfully competed being the three-minute trot and the three-minute trot and pace. Mayor Todd and Hilda S. were the only Island-owned horses that competed at the meeting. Hilda was as successful as the stallion. She was driven by Peter Conroy to victory in three events—2.19 class and two free-for-all races. The 2.24 class was won by Bob Mac, formerly owned in this province. It is noteworthy that of the six races which comprised the programme of the meeting, Hilda S. and Mayor Todd between them accounted for five firsts, while the sixth race was won by a horse that was bred in this Island. The victories of the Island horses this year are shining in turf history. It is without parallel the most successful year the turf representatives of this province have ever had. They have proved an immense advertisement for this country, and their owners will doubtless be encouraged by the success which they have achieved in this great sport. As to the Sydney meeting, the weather was cold and consequently the attendance was not very large.—Gracie Mac, 2.23 1/4, owned by R. J. King, of Sydney, will be sent over to the Island this fall to be bred to Mayor Todd, 2.18 1/4. Grace was bred and formerly owned in this province.—An ice circuit is talked of for the coming winter months. Sydney horsemen are getting ready several good ones, including Otto Oakes, 2.17 1/4, Billy and Walter J., 2.08 1/2.

**A MONSTER DREDGE.**—There is at present lying alongside the Marine wharf the dredge McDougald, which is to do the dredging for the new Of a size far larger than any dredge is owned by the Monarch Construction Co., Ltd., of Montreal, who have been awarded the contract for the dredging of a water for larger than any dredge that has ever yet been seen in these waters, the McDougald is at once an object of unusual interest. Some details to her capacity will give striking proof as to her size. She has a dredging capacity of 4,000 cubic yards daily. The scow that forms part of her equipment is a monster. The dredge is fitted with bucket apparatus. The bucket has a capacity equal to 7 1/2 yards, and holds about 11 tons of mud, while its weight is about ten tons. The bucket goes to a depth of 49 feet, and at full working measure is capable of lifting 8,000 tons of mud a day. The main derrick, which is of massive iron, is 65 feet in length and weighs about 60 tons, while the dipper arm is also 60 feet long, with a weight of about 25 tons. The machinery is of the compound hoisting type, and the bucket is operated on a single wire, this being a solid steel cable, two and a half inches in diameter. The dredge is splendidly provided as regards accommodation for her crew, having quarters to accommodate 25 men. These quarters are excellently fitted up and are lighted, as is the whole

dredge, with electricity, provided by her own dynamo. The McDougald, which is commanded by Capt. Isaley, arrived here a few days ago. She came to Charlottetown from Picton, where she put in from St. John for the purpose of being copper-plated. She is at present being fitted out and got ready for her task, which begins about the end of the present week. The work she has to do is to dredge about 130,000 yards, and at this, it is expected, she will be engaged for about five weeks. She was towed to this port by two steam tugs, the Muscatonge and the Betty D., both being very powerful tugs, especially the latter.
