ABSENCE OF VENDOR'S LABEL MUST BE SHOWN

Important Decision In Recent Prohibition Appeal Case

Following is the text of a recent judgment by Mr. Justice Arsenault in the case of:—Harry Roberts, Appellant, and The King—Respondent:

This is an appeal from a conviction of the Stipendiary Magistrate Mr. Donald McKinnon, K. C. whereby the appellant was fined the sum of \$500.00 or six months imprisonment in goal for a first offense for contravention of the Prohibition Act.

The chief witness for the prosecution relates that within the dates mentioned in the information he went to the appellant's home in company with a friend and asked for liquor. The appellant told him he had no liquor but said that there was some in the adjoining field and to go and help himself. He went and brought back a tiddy, that is a bottle containing about twelve ounces of liquor, which he says was rum. He then handed the appellant the sum of \$150.

The evidence is that the field in which the liquor was found did not belong to the appellant, but to a neighbor. The appellant says that on crossing the field that day he saw the liquor there, and that he knew it was there. There was no proof before me that the liquor found did not have the Prohibition Commission vendor's label on the bottle. I seriously doubt the appellant's story of having found the liquor in the field, and that it did not belong to him but the burden was on the prosecution to prove two facts (1) that the liquor sold to the witness was in the appellant's possession and (2) that the liquor did not have a vendor's label on it. The prosecution has failed to prove these facts. Had the information been for selling instead of for being in possession I am of the opinion that the prosecution would have succeeded on the evidence before the Magistrate. The prosecution could have applied for an amendment, which the Magistrate could have made, but I have no such power of amendment. In the circumstance I reluctantly have to grant the appeal and set aside the Magistrate's conviction which is accordingly done.

The appellant has no such merits as entitles him to costs and the conviction is set aside without costs.
