(Halifax Herald) The Prince Edward Island diocese of the Catholic Church will have a new bishop whose appointment has just been announced, a man of broad understanding, scholarship and experience in the field. 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SPEECH ON BUDGET BY MR. H. H. COX

Speaking in the Legislature on the Budget debate last week, Mr. H. H. Cox, Second District, Conservative, emphasized the up and down of farming in the Province by stating that in his experience as a trader, he had purchased potatoes at eight cents a bushel from farmers, and had sold so paid as high as \$3.75 a bushel.

He went on to review the million dollar bond issue made by a former Conservative government at 6.12 interest, claiming that this was the highest interest rate paid by any Province, even at that time. He also claimed that \$35,000 had been spent on plans for a Pocomo Hospital. These plans, he said, involved \$288,000 of unnecessary expenditure. "It is no use for them to criticize the Liberals when they make such a mass of things themselves," he added.

When the Liberals took office they found the highways in a "disastrous state." Over three million and a half dollars had been "wasted" on the roads by the Conservatives. Dealing with the transportation problem, he said the Government was doing everything in its power to get the new car ferry built as speedily as possible. The best way to get it would be a cause-way out into deep water on both sides, as suggested by the Premier. The tunnel project was out of the question.

Mr. Heath Strong: "Is the contract let for the boat yet?" Mr. Cox: "No, it isn't." Mr. Cox: "No, I don't know, but they say it is."

Continuing, he commended the Opposition leader for doing more for the Red Cross Society than any else in the Province. He "ought every member should contribute something out of his pocket to discuss financial matters."

YORK, England, March 20 —(CP) —Dr. C. Garbett, Archbishop of York, writing in his diocesan leaflet, has suggested a new type of marriage ceremony—a recedication service with a general marriage vows for married couples re-united after long separation.

Such a service, Dr. Garbett has said, would help husband and wife make a fresh start. "Where there has been unfaithfulness on one side or the other, the Christian must refuse to accept the position as hopeless," he said. "There must be readiness to forgive."

Clergymen of some other denominations were not quite in agreement with the archbishop. Dr. Scott Lidgett of the Methodist Church said: "It seemed to suggest that the church expected condemned falling in affection or respect between married people. If the service was to be one of thanksgiving for reunion, I should heartily approve."

LONDON, March 20 —(AP) —Young King Peter of Yugoslavia married his Greek Princess, Alexandra, today in one of the quietest royal weddings London has ever seen. King George VI, Alexander and pretty young Alexandra 23 and pretty young Alexandra, who risked the wrath of his people in defying a tradition that forbade the king to marry on their own soil, today completed half the object of his present visit to London. The other half being the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, the Duchess of Kent, and Foreign Secretary Eden.

The ceremony was performed by Archbishop Ristanovitz of the Serbian Church and Archbishop Germanos of the Greek Church. If the wedding party will take his bride to California to live. Most of his vast personal wealth is invested in the United States.

Aquith's Daughter In Big Liberal Job

LONDON, March 20 —(CP) —Lady Violet Bonham-Carter has accepted the invitation of the Liberal Party executive to succeed the late Lord Meston as president of the party organization.

The Liberal Party women announced its vice-presidents, but Lady Violet will be the first woman president and is expected to take a prominent part in the party's affairs.

Thus the daughter of H. H. Asquith, Britain's prime minister from 1906 to 1916, becomes leader of the party whose policies her father was so long an outstanding exponent.

The Daily Express expressed satisfaction at the party's choice and noted that in this, country women form a majority of the electorate and will pay an increasing role in the constituencies, in parliament and in the government.

Lady Violet is generally recognized as the best woman speaker that any political party has got for introducing to public life. Said the Daily Express: "Lady Violet has inherited her father's gift of a devastating logic in political exposition."
