**Woolen Mill Project**—Some time ago, it will be recalled, the Charlottetown Board of Trade had before it a communication from Mr. J. C. Jardine of Summerside with regard to a proposal to organize a woolen manufacturing plant in this island, on the authority of a man with thirty years' experience in the line of the woolen goods, who gave it as his opinion that a plant turning out knitted underwear of first class quality could be made in P. E. Island. A suggestion was made regarding the formation of a company with a capital of from \$50,000 to \$75,000 which could erect a plant capable of a daily capacity of twelve and a half dozen suits of underwear, with a 20 per cent. return to investors. The Board of Trade placed the matter in the hands of Mr. J. E. B. McCready, the Publicity Agent, to obtain further information about it. Now it appears that it has been found impossible to raise the capital for the formation of such a company in Summerside, and an attempt is to be made, it is understood, to float the project in Charlottetown. But as regards this nothing has taken definite shape yet.
