Opening with the Class A Trot and Pace, there were two entries in this section, Guy Aubrey and Rhodola D., with the honors going to Guy Aubrey.

In the Class A Pace Molly Bars crossed under the wire ahead of Babe Britton.

In the Class B Trot and Pace there were three contenders, Lucky Guy, Care Aubrey and Range Hawk. Range Hawk driven by R. H. Phillips, although only a two-year-old colt and therefore facing unfair competition, nevertheless gave an excellent account of his ability.

Guy Aubrey, Babe Britton and Molly Bars staged a championship trot and pace with Guy Aubrey first to finish. This win for Guy Aubrey annexed the Frank MacKenzie trophy, while the trophy for the best colt of the season so far was garnered by Range Hawk who has been a consistent winner in most meets all winter.

Officials stated yesterday that another card would be presented Saturday afternoon should present good conditions continue to prevail.

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SYDNEY, N.S., March 21 — (CP) — The Maritime senior champion Sydney Millionaires showed determination in their aim for newer hockey horizons by polishing off Pembroke Lumber Kings, Ottawa District titlists, 3-1, in the first game of a best-of-five Allan Cup eastern quarter-final before 3,498 fans here tonight.

Second game of the series will be played here Wednesday night. The teams then move to Ottawa for completion of the round, with the third contest billed for the Ottawa Auditorium Saturday night.

Pembroke goalkeeper Murphy mixed good, steady netminding with a smattering of Irish luck to avert a snow-slide score. Millionaires outshot the opposition 36-16 and this was a fair indication of the play. Sydney missed at least a dozen open goals.

Lumber Kings slipped into the fray minus defenseman Ralph Toohy whose eligibility was questioned by the Sydney club before start of the game. Toohy started the season with Moncton Hawks of the Maritime Senior League but was later released because he showed "insufficient ability."

Sydney set the pace from the opening face-off and kept it until the end.

The speed was probably the only indication of playoff hockey. Otherwise it was a loose game although Millionaires backchecked and screened their blue line extremely well.

Pembroke defenses provided a hit-and-miss protection in front of Murphy. There was considerably more hits than hit, however, as Sydney forwards eluded the heavier checks and made the crimson-clad blockade stumble clumsily on occasion.

Referees Ken Holmes and Red Farrell took a lenient view of the proceedings, handing out only three penalties.

At present, with each team playing 60 games — 30 at home and an equal number on the road — there are a total of 180 N.H.L. engagements to be worked out during the playing season. Extending from October until the following March, the N.H.L. season now runs a full 28 weeks, exclusive of training periods and playoffs.

A 70-game schedule for the league's six teams would mean a jump to 210 playing dates for the season. President Campbell felt, and the Governors agreed, that these extra games couldn't be fitted into the 23 weeks as at present, and that an extra week would have to be added. This would have the regular schedule running practically to the end of March, with the playoffs dragging on until after the baseball season had opened, a not too desirable situation.

"The greatest drawback to any effort to lengthen the N.H.L. schedule comes from what the President termed 'backouts' in playing dates at the various rinks. That is, there are certain periods during the season when ice skating shows, circuses and other attractions take over from hockey."

President Clarence Campbell of the N.H.L. presented a draft schedule he had prepared, and which represented, as he put it, "several hundred hours of work." But the difficulties of fitting in this longer playing schedule in the present playing season, he explained, were too great for any advantages that would be obtained.

"Governors of the National Hockey League at their Spring meeting last week discussed fully the question of a longer schedule for the 1949-50 season. After looking into all the arguments, pro and con, the club chieftains decided to shelve the matter, and so there will be no 70-game schedule for the next year, at least.

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S. D. U. And St. F. X. Battle To 8-All Tie

Playing to an 8-8 tie, Saint Dunstan's and Saint Francis Xavier Universities staged about as smart a game of hockey as one would want to see at the Forum last night in an exhibition encounter.

Hitting a terrific clip right from the opening whistle, both squads played a wide-open, smooth passing brand of hockey which kept a crowd of some 900 fans on the edge of their seats roaring with excitement as the boys kept the game rolling from one zone to the other in a series of smart passing attacks that took them in on the opposing goalies who both turned in stellar performances at times, to block off some really dangerous scoring attempts by both teams.

With neither team holding more than a one-goal advantage over their opponent at any stage of the game, the lead changed hands several times, as one team or the other managed to take advantage of the breaks and hold the edge for brief periods.

The line of Ferren, Morrison and Alf Chaisson lead the bulk of the S. F. X. attack, accounting for seven of their team's eight goals, Ferren being the top goalgetter with a total of four, while Morrison garnered two goals and two assists, Chaisson following with one goal and four assists. Ray MacIntosh got the remaining tally for the visitors.

Leading the scoring parade for Saint Dunstan's was Cart MacDonald with two goals and two assists, with both Ledwell and Houde equaling the task with two goals each. McAdam and Bernard accounted for the other two Saint's tallies.

The game was a very cleanly played affair with only three penalties being handed out for very minor infractions.

Garnering one goal apiece in the early part of the first frame, the boys really played close hockey, with neither being able to break through for any further scoring until the 18:30 mark, when they both blew the lid off with a wild scoring spree which saw five goals rapped home in 66 seconds of play, in a series of wide-open passing attacks, the Saints outshooting their rivals by a 3-2 margin at the end of the period.

Opening up strong in the second canto, St. F. X. tied up the score at 6:31 and came along to counter again at 10:35 to hold a one-goal advantage, only to have the Saints come roaring back less than three minutes later to tie up the score again. The tally came off the stick of Cliff Bernard, who pulled a really smart solo effort from his own blue line to stick-handle his way through almost the entire opposing team to pot a hard shot from close in. Both teams speeded it up again in the remaining minutes of play with Ferren scoring on a snappy three-man attack with A. Chaisson and Morrison at 19:23 to go one in front again, but 20 seconds later Houde, MacDonald and Hennessey pulled a smart counter-attack on a three-way play, with Houde getting the goal to tie up the score 6-6 at the end of the period.
