# THE NEW YORK LETTER.

It's all over. Funny thing too. Here's New York quiet as Boston or Halifax, the very next day after. Election Night was a never-to-be-forgotten scene, one that will not fade from the memory of Mr. Hiram Oatcake from Pompton, N. J. And a funny thing, too—people can hardly believe they were wildly crazy for two weeks. The "day after" the "free and independent" voters of this great republic attended to the obsequies of W. J. B. as calm and colorless as the Polar waste. American people volatile, you say? Well, hardly. Only a job well done, and they were willing to forget it. They resumed the ordinary pursuits with retransquilized suavity. They had crucified Bryan with a crown of silver upon a cross of gold.

It's silly to wonder why! A few there were who really doubted McKinley's reelection, but there was more hope of a fool than of those men. Here was a President up again for suffrage who had waged successful war against a hated enemy; who had filled the pockets of his "subjects"—subjects is good, isn't it—to overflow; who had heaped every dinnerpail from The Narrows to the Golden Gate; who had enacted a tariff wall which was the ideal and the delight of every discerning wage-earner and of every patriotic employer; who had maintained dignified and peaceful relations with all the great nations of the world with malice to none; and who had marshalled under the Stars and Stripes, strange new races and lands whose representatives will one day sit at Washington. What could defeat him? Nothing. The Democrats were left only the patches and shreds of a platform of reputation and negation. And they were guilty of the most blundering, stupid and criminal of all mistakes—the mistake of believing that the American people will pull down the flag where once it has gone up. There never has been, and there never will be, a nation which is opposed to a war of conquest.

So they fell and great was the fall. See returns. Free silver really cut little figure as an issue. I believe that without the faint and diffident articulation which Bryan did give to this old fetish, he would have fared much worse than he did. The South and the Middle West would have had none of him if it had not been for his silver predilections. A good way of saying it would be, that silver helped Bryan far more in these states than it hurt him in New York and elsewhere nearer the Atlantic, for the anomaly existed that the Eastern States considered his silver doctrine perfectly futile while the ingenuous South and Middle people had daily visions of the day when they would cart silver bullion to Washington, and have each 53 cents worth decorated with the imprimatur of Caesar, while "In God We Trust" related very aptly to the other 47 cents.

Nor did imperialism's bogey do much to help, while it did lots to hurt, the Quixote of 1890 and 1900. No doubt many of the illiterate German and Irish vote eagerly succumbed to the party which promised them a "chance" at perfidious Albion, but that Boer plank did little else than excite amusement, indignation and contempt. It was at once inept, fatuous, cowardly and insincere. And among the many pleasing results of the election none is more significant than the stunning rebuke which has been administered to these "foreign breeds without the law."

After all, it was only the common sense of the American people asserting itself to avert national dishonor and disaster.

### DEWEY ARCH TO GO.

Visitors to New York, who have rubbered at the famous Dewey Arch, which, with its colonnades and refuge of bas-relief, has lent a Graeco-Roman atmosphere to the plaza in front of the Fifth Avenue Hotel, will not see it again unless they come quick. It is to "go." It has been in a state of innocuous desuetude for many moons, little resembling with its fractured plaster, the fairy vision of white of a year ago. They have a good gag at the variety houses about it. Like this: "Say, do you know that what this country falls behind Europe in is old ruins. We haven't anything in that line to interest the traveller. Is that so? Have you seen the Dewey Arch?"

But the quality of Twain's after-the-walnuts' ad dresses is a decided disappointment. Now it isn't right to expect that Homer shall never nod and that even a professional humorist, who is dragged out to dinner into distinguished company with all the nerve tension that means, shall pour forth drolleries which shall be as apples of gold in pictures of silver. But one at least expects that there shall be dullness without vulgarity rather than vulgarity with imbecility. Laboring under the torturing consciousness of expected brilliancy Twain chooses to be vulgar with imbecility. He has said scarcely one good or new thing, but has indulged at each dinner he has attended in coarse crude witticisms of the kind known as "obvious," such as send cross-roads audiences into transports of risibility. But, after all, how hard it is even for a jokesmith to be always or even consistently brilliant! While the world has the unmatched "Innocents Abroad" and the "New Pilgrim's Progress" and "Huckleberry Finn" it will always turn to Mark Twain with the remembrances of laughter and of tears.
