For The Cook

JELLIED TONGUE

One medium-sized tongue, 1 1/2 envelopes gelatine, 1 cup cold water, 1 can tomatoes, 1/2 medium-sized onion, 1 bay leaf, 2 tablespoons celery, 2 cloves, pinch cayenne, 2 tablespoons vinegar, salt. Boil tongue until tender (about two hours), or until the skin will peel off readily. Remove the skin, and put the tongue in a good-sized mold with the tip of the tongue in the centre, and the remainder coiled about it. If necessary, use a skewer to hold in place. Soak gelatine in cold water for 5 minutes, and cook all other ingredients together for 10 minutes, excepting the vinegar. Then add the softened gelatine and vinegar, and stir until dissolved. Pass all through a very fine sieve, pouring it over the tongue. Allow to set in a cool place. When ready for use let the mould stand in hot water about a second to loosen it, and serve on a platter garnished with water cress.

A shank of veal boiled until it drops from the bone, and the meat taken off, chopped and placed in a mould in place of the tongue, makes an equally appetizing dish.

For the philanderer deceives himself when he thinks he pays his wife for his disloyalty by giving her a good home and a liberal dress allowance and ordering the confectioner and the florist to send her up a box of chocolates or a lunch of posies.

No woman so dull as not to know conscience money. No woman so humble as to have an appetite for the crumbs of attention that fall from another woman's table. No woman on earth who willingly shares her husband with other women.

"Warts" Under Skin

Dear Miss Leeds—I always read your column, and I noticed lately that you wrote an article on blackheads and whiteheads.

I noticed that I have little warts underneath my skin. At first I thought they were whiteheads, but I was told they are warts by a skin doctor who didn't seem to make much out of them outside of telling me to use castor oil at night. I have done this for some time but with no results.

If diet has anything to do with it I will say that I eat a lot of vegetables, but I must have my bread three times a day.

I noticed today that I even have them coming out around the temples. I would appreciate it if you could suggest something for this condition.



I was thinking of having them taken off (although they are very small) with an electric needle. They seem more prominent around the eyes.

Answer—In spite of what the skin doctor told you, your description of the "warts" makes me strongly suspect that they are whiteheads after all. Whiteheads, as you likely know, are clogged pores just the same as blackheads, only being under the outer layer of skin they remain white. They are usually most numerous around the eyes, and if not removed dry up into horny specks greatly resembling warts. The correct way to treat these blemishes is to prick them open with a sterilized needle (be sure it is sterilized), press out the white matter inside and then use an antiseptic wash. The following makes a good lotion to apply: two ounces rose-water, sixty grains sulphate of zinc, one ounce oil of sweet almonds. Mix well and massage into the skin until it dries. Finish the treatment by applying a little toilet water to close the pores.

However, since one doctor has diagnosed your trouble as warts it might be wise for you to see another before trying any home remedies on these blemishes. It is often dangerous to tamper with a wart and if a thoroughly reliable skin specialist calls them that, it would be best for you to leave the treatment to him. From your description their removal should not be a serious matter.
