To Dislodge Chinese With Giant Bombs

Text Of Gov't. Trade Bill Is Made Public

Goods From Canada And Other Dominions Will Be Exempt Until November 15 Next—New Bill Will Change Whole Fiscal System Of Great Britain.

PARLIAMENT TO PROBE PRICE OF GASOLINE

High Price In Canada Urged As Reason For Investigation.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 11.—The House of Commons was asked this afternoon to place itself on record that the price of gasoline to the Canadian consumer has for some time past been too high. The request came from Dr. T. F. Donnelly, (Lib. Willow Bunch) who asked that a resolution endorsing this statement should be referred to the committee on banking and commerce of the Commons for investigation and report.

After asserting that the use of gasoline has increased greatly for business and pleasure, Dr. Donnelly gave the following figures in gallons on production and consumption in Canada:

LONDON, Feb. 11. (By the Canadian Press Cable)—Goods from Canada, the other Dominions, India, Southern Rhodesia and mandated territories of the Dominions will be exempt until November 15 next from all provisions of the government's trade bill, seeking to institute a general ten per cent tariff, the text of which was published in the House of Commons today.

Two new provisions, concerning which the government had not said anything, and the first full list of the articles exempt, are contained in the text of the government's "trade bill."

The duties are not applicable to goods from other parts of the empire, at least until after the Imperial Economic Conference, which meets next July.

Welcome Surprise

One new provision is a welcome surprise to shipbuilding interests. Imported goods consigned direct to a shipbuilding yard and intended to be used in the building, repairing and refitting of ships in that yard, will be exempted from the 10 per cent duty. This effectually secures the exemption of the raw materials for one of the greatest of British industries. The other new provision is for a census of production. Instead of having to wait for long periods the Board of Trade will now be enabled to get, at any time, information on production that it desires.

Another Feature

Another important feature revealed by the text is that the new tariff advisory committee will not be permitted to consider any additions to the free list, until the 10 per cent duty has been in force for at least six months.

Chief articles on the free list, and articles therefore on which the Dominions will not receive the additional 10 per cent measure of imperial preference, are:

Wheat in grain, meat, including bacon, raw cotton and raw wool, fish of British catch, tea, newspapers, newsprint in rolls containing not less than 70 per cent mechanical woodpulp; wood pulp, raw rubber, iron ore and tin ore. All agricultural and horticultural products.

MUSSOLINI IS RECEIVED BY HIS HOLINESS

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 11.—Benito Mussolini knelt and kissed the ring of Pope Pius in Fascist reverence for the Catholic Church today. The Pope received his visitor not merely as Premier of Italy, but as the chief of the Italian State. At the end of an hour's private conference they emerged from the Throne Room of the Vatican and shook hands in friendship. Coming as it did, on the third anniversary of the signing of the Lateran Treaty between Italy and the Vatican, their handclasp was a symbol of the new peace between the Church and the Fascist State—a peace that was broken last year by Fascist outbursts against Catholic Action clubs. These were smoothed by a subsequent arrangement which in effect, was sealed today.

Will Float Bond Issue

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 11.—The city of Toronto will enter the bond market with a \$15,000,000 5-1-2 per cent serial bond issue within four weeks, finance Commissioner George Wilson announced yesterday afternoon after a conference with bond representatives from seventeen bond investment firms.

Public announcement which will come from a management committee must be delayed until March 1, Finance Commissioner Wilson stated on account of certain legal formalities which must be complied with and which will be handled by city solicitor Colquhoun.

The amount of the issue, the fact that it would be a 5-1-2 per cent serial issue, that it would be offered on March 1 or a few days later and the selection of election of the committee which will handle the loan, were the only details respecting the issue made known yesterday after the three hour conference in the Council Chamber. The conference was private and presided over by the Finance Commissioner.

SAD FATALITY AT MONTROSE ON TUESDAY

Body Of Stephen Gillis, Aged 30, Found Yesterday About Mile And Half From Home.

A sad fatality occurred at Montrose on Tuesday, when the death occurred under tragic circumstances of Mr. Stephen Gillis, a respected resident of the community.

On Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Gillis went to visit friends about two miles from his home. He did not return that evening, but his absence did not cause alarm, as he frequently went visiting for several days at a time.

Yesterday when he had not returned, enquiries were made and it was found that he had started for home on Tuesday evening in the storm.

A search was immediately begun and about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon his frozen body was found about a mile and a half from his home. Coroner Morrissey was summoned and proceeded to the scene at once. It was not known last night whether an inquest would be held or not.

Mr. Gillis, who was thirty years of age and unmarried, was living with his half-brother Wilbur, and worked with him on the farm. The late Mr. Gillis was a brother of Mrs. Urban Gillis, of Miscouche.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, Feb. 11.—Maxim Litvinoff, Russia's Commissar for Foreign Affairs, submitted his government's traditional radical proposals for total disarmament to the arms conference today but accompanied them with enough conciliatory promises of co-operation to win a measure of approval from the delegations of capitalist states.

Recognizing that his proposals, which were rejected by the conference's preparatory commission, had slight chance of acceptance now, Moscow's aggressive spokesman recommended to the conference a

HEROIC PRIEST GAINS FOUR HOUR TRUCE

Peace was insured in the Chapel area of Shanghai between the hours of 8 a. m. and noon today through the activity of Father Jaquinot, a Catholic priest who lost an arm and won a decoration for valor at Verdun. Father Jaquinot, head of the College of St. Francis Xavier, who has the rank of Major in the Shanghai volunteer corps, has been in and out of Chapel on missions of mercy numerous times since the hostilities started. Through his good offices both the Chinese and Japanese agreed to the four-hour truce in order that civilians might be moved out of the war-torn area. When they are gone the ground will be clear for the military men.

CAR FERRY IS ADEQUATE FOR REQUIREMENTS

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 11.—The new ice-breaking Car Ferry S. S. Charlottetown, which is in operation across the Strait of Northumberland between Cape Tormentine, N. B., and Borden, P. E. I., forming the main line connection of the Canadian National Railways between the mainland and Prince Edward Island, is performing in a most satisfactory manner, declared H. T. Hazen, assistant chief engineer of the railway at Moncton today, after having made an inspection of the car ferry with regional railway officers and representatives from the architects and builders.

The car ferry, Mr. Hazen stated, had her first tryout under ice conditions yesterday when she successfully navigated through the ice in the Strait which was from two to ten feet thick.

JAPANESE DETERMINED TO REDUCE FORTS BY BIG AERIAL ATTACK

Two Weeks Of Dogged Resistance By Chinese Necessitates Military Operation On Large Scale—Catholic Priest Who Was Decorated at Verdun, Plays Important Role In Four Hour Truce.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 12.—(Friday)—The Japanese high command determined today to reduce the stubborn Chinese forts at Woosung with 500-pound aerial bombs. Two weeks of dogged resistance by the Chinese in the Shanghai-Woosung area have convinced the Japanese staff that the only way to reach a decision is by a large scale military operation, and these bombs, capable of causing terrific destruction, will prepare the way for assault lines of infantrymen with bayonets.

Preparing For Big Coup

When the zero hour will come remained a secret, but it will be soon. The expected arrival of more reinforcements from Japan to swell the already strong attacking force was one of the factors that held up the action today. Already 40 Japanese warships and transports have been jammed into the Yangtze estuary. When the engagement starts, the Japanese will be involved in one of their largest military actions since the Russo-Japanese war.

Will Warn Neutral Ships

Before the action starts the ships of all nations will receive word that during certain hours it will be dangerous to navigate the Whangpoo and the Yangtze in the vicinity of the forts. During Thursday there was little action and no change in front. The day was Japan's National holiday and the Japanese celebrated the 2592nd anniversary of the founding of their nation in gay fashion.

Japs Celebrate Holiday

Visitors at Woosung headquarters drank toasts and offered Banzai salutations in honor of the first Emperor. There was, however, a few reminders of conflict. Now and again a Japanese naval gun boomed forth from one of the ships in the river and there were occasional bursts of rifle fire from the Chinese line.

Bombs Will Be Dropped Only On Woosung

The 500-pound bombs will be dropped only at Woosung. Their terrific power would make it impossible for them to be used at Chapel because of the nearness of the International Settlement. Experts said such explosives would break windows for miles around and cause untold property damage. These bombs will be used to destroy the Woosung guns along the seashore as well as the Chinese positions to the rear of and defending those forts from land attack.

Picture Canada Wild And Woolly Place

'Hokey' Magazine Banned From Mails

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 9.—"Hokey", a monthly humor magazine, published by popular magazines Inc., Louisville, Kentucky, has been prohibited importation into Canada under the provisions of the customs tariff, according to an announcement of the Department of National Revenue today.

UNEMPLOYED RUSH CHAMBER; ATTACK PREM.

Nfld. Gov't. Ministers Given Rough Passage By Demonstrators.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 11. (By the Canadian Press)—Dissatisfied with assurance from the Secretary of State that the Government was doing all possible to alleviate conditions several hundred unemployed men demanded an audience with Prime Minister Sir Richard Squires this afternoon, forced their way into the Government building and smashed the glass doors of the council chamber where a meeting of the executive council was in progress. As the crowd rushed forward the Prime Minister received a blow on the face and had one hand wrenched. Some of the demonstrators mounted the council table while others flung articles about the room. The mob dispersed when orders to issue "dole" were handed out.

Will Table Communications Re Labrador
