There is something infinitely pathetic in the present position of the once proud kingdom of Poland. Taking time in the historical sense, it is only yesterday that the poverty-stricken little principality of Prussia, confronted by enemies on several frontiers, hastened to place itself under the protection of its mighty neighbor. Soon afterwards, by the exercise of trickery which can best be summed up as essentially Prussian, it had the greatest stage in mid-Europe at its mercy, torn by internal dissensions and drifting to collapse. It was then that the most shameful murder in history took place, Prussia and Austria and Russia being the culprits. They murdered a nation and divided its territory among themselves. Since then Poland has been sundered apart, being Germanized, and Austrianized, and Russianized. Today, involved in a war of which it is pathetically innocent, it is torn and ravaged and fought over, and to find a nightmare of horror. The position of Poland is far worse than that of Belgium ever was. It is the nation of nearly two hundred millions of people is passing through the twilight of its transition stage from the darkness of absolutism to the brilliant light of freedom and democracy. There is nothing so shows the unscrupulous manner in which the two German Empires had prepared for the war deliberately, for long years past, than the fact that their one hundred millions of people can hold back on their Eastern frontier alone the tremendous armies of the Czar. Russia, with her quiet heroism and her day of national prayer and her faith in her own good cause, is already miles in front of the soulless, materialistic, Haackel-fed Germany, so far as national worth is concerned. Germany may have been ready for war before her, and she will probably be ready for peace first also.—Toronto Evening News.

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## A LETTER FROM THE FRONT

The following is a letter received by Mrs. M. F. McDonald, Eldon Belfast from her son Milton who is now at the front. Dear Mother:— Just a few lines to let you know that I am still well and alive and enjoying everything pretty well. We are in a lovely position now. My worst regret is that we are not allowed a camera to get some snaps of the different places we get to. Our last position was all shot to pieces with shrapnel but they never got near the guns although the shells struck within twenty five yards of them. It is all very interesting although rather dangerous at times. I am keeping a diary of our life which some day I may be able to show to you. It is surprising to see the farmers and their wives working in the fields and shells passing over their heads and occasionally bursting quite near. They don't seem to realize the danger of such a farmhouse and other buildings right close to it. I shall, one of the girls was struck breaking her leg in two places. But as soon as it was over they went back, a few days later it was shelled again and the explosion set fire to it so they had to quit for good. It is only an ordinary case for a shell to drop in a house and kill women and children or whatever the inhabitants may be. I don't think that the boys around here or they would surely all enlist and do their best. They cannot all be such cowards as to stay home for fear of what would happen to them out here. We have a funny fellow here (a Newfoundland) and every French girl he sees he is
