POSTAL TERMINAL SCHEME A MODEL OF EFFICIENCY

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—A population of a million for Toronto within ten years time is anticipated in plans which are being worked out in the laboratory of the federal postoffice department for the movement of mail to and from Postal Terminal Station A, in the east wing of the new union station.

The model scheme which has been evolved takes the viaduct development as completed. Then terminal tracks are shown with chutes installed to guide the mail bags to automatic conveyors, and many other labor and time saving devices in operation.

Every minutest detail of Toronto's postoffice problem is being taken into consideration in the perfecting of a plan which for efficiency and economy will not be equalled on the continent. The model occupies almost an entire room on the third floor of the postoffice department building.

Some of the members of the company who had been in the separate organization have reunited and the case last night was one of the strongest. There were Captain Plunkett, in his tuneless catchy songs and in dust with his brother Morley; "Red" Newman, in some brand-new clothes and some equally new songs; Stan Bennett, with his priceless drawl, and his "howdahs" and "my words"; Ben Allen with his "germon" and his miserly turns; Pat Rafferty, with his jolly, the three "girls" of the troupe, the ever-popular "Marjorie" (Ross Hamilton), "her" capable understudy, Jock Holland, and an entirely new star, Glenn Allan. Glenn Allan, who is a strikingly dainty and convincing female impersonator, executes three dance numbers, the theme and costumes in connection with which are his own conception. All are graceful and effective to a degree, particularly his "Dance Oriental."

Although encores were frequent throughout the show, the most pronounced demonstration of approval was undoubtedly accorded Red Newman's song, "Don't Let Them Scrap the British Navy," which he delivered with fine fervor and dramatic energy. Another bit of the revue which was particularly well received was a sketch entitled "A Canadian's Dream," in which two long-suffering chaps, a Canadian soldier and an English Tommy, enjoy in dreams the luxury of having tea in bed, served by the sergeant-major, who is under their orders. The dream ends with the erstwhile sergeant-major announcing to the two soldiers that they have been raised to the rank of field marshals. The sketch is rich in comedy and is presented by a thoroughly competent cast, including Stan Bennett, "Red" Newman, Pat Rafferty, Freddie Treener and Bill Roberts.

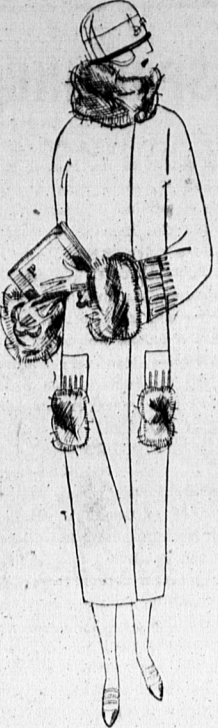
