Singer Criticises Shirking Mothers

NEW YORK, April 26—Alma Gluck, former Metropolitan Opera singer and wife of Efram Zimbalist, violinist, today criticized mothers who hire people to bring their children up.

"A woman doesn't have to be a psychologist to be a good mother, she merely has to give some of herself to her children," said Miss Gluck, who is one of the speakers on the child health day programme, sponsored by the American Child Health Association.

This slender Rumanian, who has entranced audiences in various parts of the world, has had time to raise three children and manage several homes. She is a grandmother too.

"I think I am a rotten mother and a rotten housekeeper, but my conscience keeps spurring me along," she said.

Maria, Virginia, 16, and Efram Jr., 13, both love music, but they have to be "policed" by their mother before they will practice. Mrs. Marcia Davenport, the elder daughter, is the mother of a seven-year old girl, and an author.

"I felt like a coward after Marcia was born," the singer said. "I was on tour then and had to leave her to be raised by friends in Philadelphia.

"My children haven't had the great privilege my husband and I had—poverty. It is the great dynamo of all living."

Mothers are to blame when children lack ambition, she believes.

"We talk of the younger generation being a problem," she said. "It's the women between 35 and 50 who have found their liberty and dancing partners who have gone berserk."

New Buildings To Suit District

MANCHESTER, England, April 19—(By the Canadian Press)—A movement is under way to ensure that the beautiful Lake District shall not be spoiled by unsuitable buildings being erected in that part of England, the movement being sponsored by the Royal Institute of British Architects and the Society for the Preservation of Rural England, with the approval of the Ministry of Health.

Every authority of the Lake District recently received a copy of a pamphlet which announced the formation of architectural panels which offer voluntary help in the scrutiny of plans and designs submitted to local authorities for their approval. These panels were originated by the Royal Institute of British Architects and the Society for the Preservation of Rural England. In introducing its appeal the Lake District Safeguarding Society remarks the district is more fortunate in the persistent use of local stone and local slates. The fells and lakes could not be spoiled, but the beauty of roads might easily be marred in the present day, when old styles of building seem expensive. Therefore it is necessary to encourage builders and owners as much as possible to put up buildings in harmony with their surroundings.

"New buildings," it says, "can be quite as attractive as old ones, thereby adding to the beauty of their surroundings, and in such districts as this it is felt that more consideration should be given to their appearance than is the case at present. Everyone will agree that local materials are the most appropriate and that the introduction of the characteristic features of our old buildings should be encouraged."

WINDSOR, Ont., April 27—(By the Canadian Press)—After having served four years, two months and eight days in the United States regular army forces at Fort Wayne, Detroit, Mich., and having twice taken the oath of allegiance to United States, William C. Jones has been deported to Canada on the grounds that he entered the United States illegally.

The alleged illegal entry was made last winter at Bonner's Ferry, Idaho, when Jones was returning from a 60 day furlough which he had spent with relatives at Calgary. Jones says he did not know he was breaking any immigration regulations and adds that if he had not returned he could have been arrested as a deserter from the United States army, been extradited from Canada and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Jones alleges that when the immigration charge was laid he was told he could leave the country voluntarily and later might return by legal entry and resume life in the army. He bought his honorable discharge from the army by paying \$85 and signed papers for voluntary movement to Canada, but was taken into custody and he claims held for six weeks before he was sent to Windsor on a deportation order.
