IN MEMORIAM

MRS. MARY ANN MCINNIS

Suddenly at Peakes Road there passed away one of its most highly respected citizens in the person of Mrs. Mary Ann McInnis, widow of the late James H. McInnis, on Nov. 25th.

She leaves to mourn five daughters and six sons who all reside in the United States with the exception of two sons, James A. of Charlottetown and Rupert on the homestead, with whom she resided since the death of her husband twenty years ago.

The spiritual boquets and floral contributions and the large concourse of people that followed her remains to St. Teresa's Church were ample evidence of the high esteem in which Mrs. McInnis was held by the people among whom she lived for seventy-six years.

Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Basil Croken who also conducted the services at the grave, where all that was mortal of a faithful and active member of the Catholic Church was laid to rest.

In the earlier evening hours of Monday, October 28th, Mr. Daniel I. McKay, a very highly respected resident of Wood Islands East passed peacefully away at the age of 60 years.

The deceased was a man of strong rugged disposition and up until a few months before the coming of the end he had always enjoyed good health. And even after he had been laid aside by his last illness it was believed for a while that he might still be restored to his former strength.

His splendid supply of reserve energy gradually waned until on the above mentioned date his gentle spirit winged its homeward flight—home to the God who gave it.

Besides a sorrowing widow, Mr. McKay leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, one daughter, Miss Mary Isabelle at home.

Mr. Daniel McKay was the only son of Robert and Isabelle (Smith) McKay of Wood Islands East. Here Daniel was born and with the exception of several short sojourns to the Canadian West he spent practically all of his life on the home stead.

He was a man who was well known throughout the whole countryside and was held in high esteem by all. Being of a somewhat retiring nature he found it rather difficult to make friends easily. Hence it was that only those who had been acquainted with him for some time came to know his true worth.

He took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the school, the church and the community. He will be greatly missed not only by a large circle of relatives and friends, but his place in all of the various activities of life will be hard to fill.

When the end drew near he remained calm and untroubled. He knew in whom he had believed and he was able to keep what he had committed to His trust against that day. The end was peaceful.

The funeral, which was one of the largest ever held in this section of the Province, was held in the Presbyterian Church, Wood Islands, on the afternoon of Wednesday, Oct. 30th. The service was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert and was a very impressive one.

Following the address Rev. Mr. Stavert sang very effectively "Will the Circle Be Unbroken." The pall bearers were Messrs. Roderick H. McMillan, Roderick W. McMillan, Roderick McKay, John R. McMillan, Wm. Brown and Archibald Munn. Interment was in the Presbyterian Cemetery, Wood Islands.
