CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—The Presbytery of P. E. Island in connection with the Church of Scotland, will meet in the Peoples Church, Charlottetown, on Wednesday the 24th, inst., at 11 a. m.

CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—Rev. Ewen Macdonald will preach Sabbath 8.15 at Brooklyn at 10.30, Peters Road at 2.30 and Murray River at 6.30 p. m. Also Monday June 1st at Iris. Tuesday 2nd at Belle River and Thursday 4th at Point Prim at 7.30 p. m.

LINEN SHOWER.—On Tuesday evening last a number of the girl friends of Miss Mary Callaghan held at her home on Graham Street and held a linen shower in her honor. Miss Callaghan's marriage to Mr. James McKenna of Montreal is announced to take place in this city, on Tuesday next.

MURRAY HARBOR BRANCH.—The summer arrangements on the Murray Harbor Branch is a distinct improvement and the people served by the railway as well as the management are to be congratulated on the change. Trains will now leave Murray Harbor, at 7 a. m., and 2 p. m., arriving in Charlottetown at 9.45 a. m. and 5.30 p. m. Trains will leave Charlottetown at 8.15 a. m. and 3.10 p. m., arriving at Murray Harbor, at 11.45 a. m., and 5.55 p. m. The morning train from Murray Harbor will be express, returning in the afternoon, while the morning train from Charlottetown will be a mixed, returning in the afternoon.

MILITARY INSPECTION.—Inspection of the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade was completed last evening by Major Edward, of the R. C. A. No. 3 Battery was inspected in section gun drill and battery manoeuvre, and the officers and N. C. O's of both batteries answered questions, which formed part of the annual examination for efficiency. It is understood that Major Edward, who is one of the finest artillery officers in Canada, is very much pleased with the showing of the regiment. He will spend two or three days fishing and will return to Halifax on Monday. Captain Regan, of the Army Pay Corps, leaves this morning for Halifax. The Captain is very popular with the officers here.

MILITARY NOTES.—Officers and men who are in close touch with the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade, state that it is now more efficient than it is today. Both batteries have been over strength throughout the training season, and the number of new applications has made it necessary for the older members to be left on their own. This and the friendly rivalry between the two batteries has created an interest and enthusiasm which has seldom been seen in the regiment. The horses used in the guns are very much better this year than before, and a great deal more time has been spent in battery manoeuvre and battery drill. As a result the regiment hopes to make a good showing in comparison with others in the Dominion.

FROM SUMMERSVILLE.—Mr. Wm. Cain of Summersville, who is in town reports the crops as being fairly good. They need more heat now and perhaps less rain, he says. The grass looks particularly good. Clover is somewhat scarce, having been killed out through the snow, but where-over the snow was held the clover was saved. The seeding is all done, except the turnips. Quite a lot of the grain is up and looks well. The lower lying grounds, however, are somewhat affected by the heavy rain. The people in Summersville and Alberry Plains keep quite a lot of sheep, and are very much interested in the dipping demonstrations that are now being held in various parts of the Province. They hope the Department of Agriculture will send the dipping tank through their way before long. The Institute is flourishing. The Ayrshire bull purchased from Simmons Bros., sometime ago is being kept by Mr. Thos. Dunn, and is in the pink of condition. He took the first prize at the Georgetown Exhibition last year and was admired by all who saw him. His stock are turning out to be particularly good milkers and the people will keep him in the neighborhood as long as possible.

The question of supplementing Mr. Dinna's generosity by the Conference formulating a plan for the engagement and support of a second evangelist during the year was thoroughly discussed. For the present the scheme was deemed impracticable. Col. F. S. In Five Parts By CHARLES KLEIN

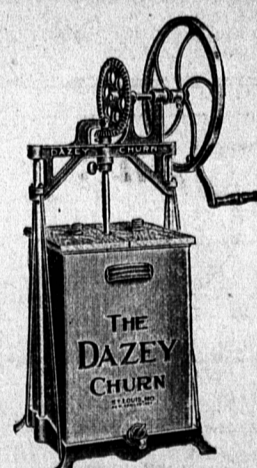

Ryder to pacify his son and to offset his attachment for Shirley Rossmore suggests that he shall marry Sarah Green, "who has proven herself far more brilliant than the Judge's girl." It is then Shirley's turn, she declares her identity and admits that she has secured certain letters from Ryder's desk that will prove her father's innocence. Ryder orders her from the house, then he sits up all night, consumes innumerable black cigars and finally conquers his own vanity. Next day Jefferson Ryder propose, but Shirley declares she will never marry a man that has such a father.
