**AUSTRALIA COUNTS HER WHEAT CROPS**

MELBOURNE, May 23—(CP)—Now that practically all the Australian wheat has been delivered, the season's yield can be closely estimated, says the Australian News Letter. It is thought that, including wheat held on farms for seed and feed purposes, 214,000,000 bushels were harvested; a remarkably heavy outturn from the reduced area sown.

The average yield per acre was the highest since 1920-21 and the total production approximates that of the previous maximum attained in 1932-33. According to a statement made by Olive McPherson, chairman of the Australian Wheat Board, 194,450,000 bushels of the season's crop have been delivered to licensed receivers. Practically all the wheat, excepting that
