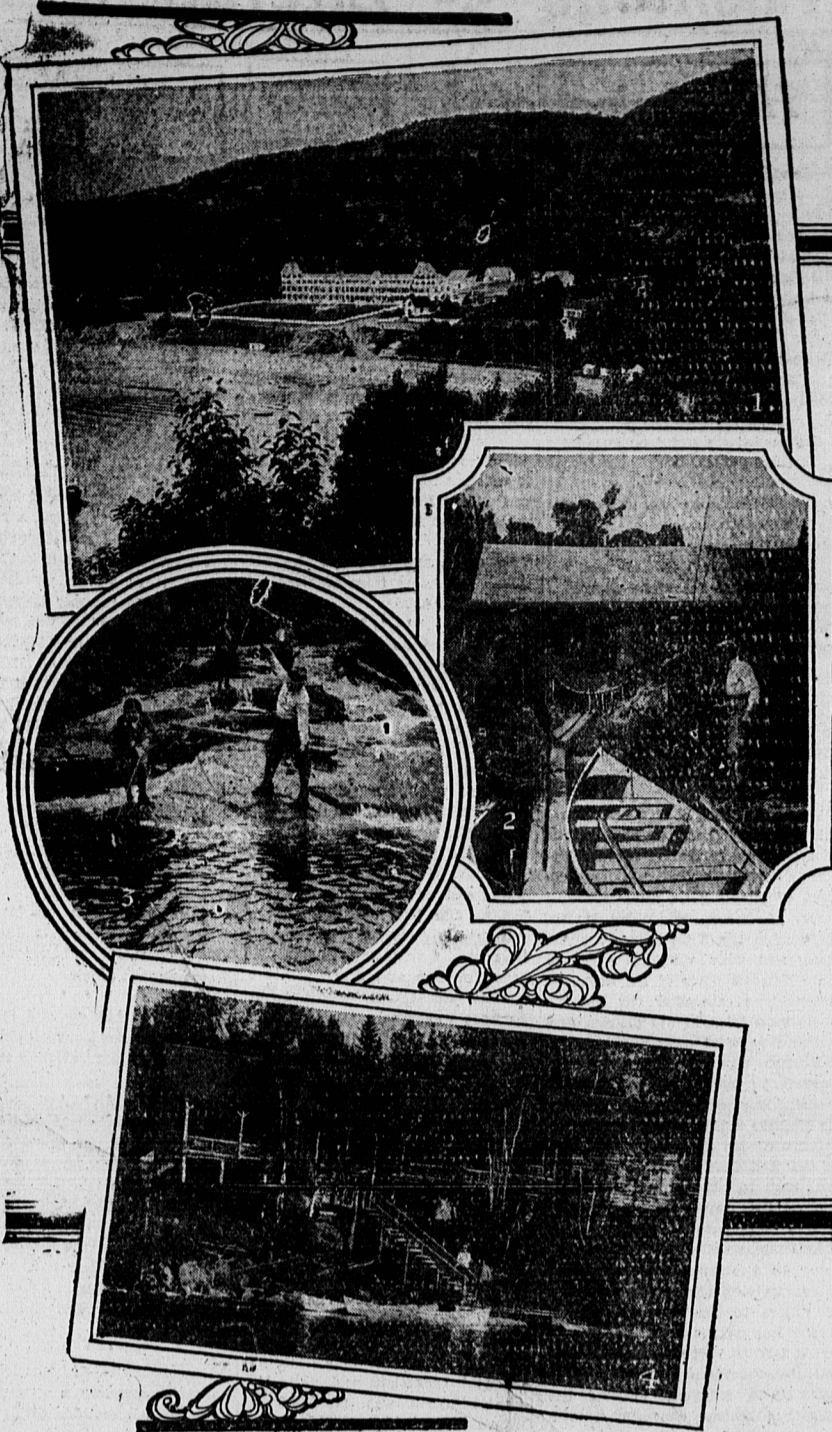


A Salt Water Cruise to Fresh Water Fishing

R. pen 19 led the contest for the week with 57 eggs, 66.6 points; The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown W.L. pen 4 were second with 57 eggs, 64.3 points, and Mr. George Boswall B.R. pen 18 were third with 55 eggs 62.1 points. Mrs. J. H. MacPhail's B.R. hen no. 8 leads in individual production with 181 eggs, 209.3 points; The Experimental Farm, Fredericton, B.R. hen no. 10 is second with 186 eggs, 209 and their hen no. 8 is third with 161 eggs, 208 points. The pens leading in total production are: 1st, Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N.B., B.R., 1603 eggs, 1753.6 points. 2nd, Mr. S. R. Pendleton, Kensington, P.E.I., B.R., 1540 eggs, 1693.7 points. 3rd, Mrs. J.H. McPhail's, New Haven, P.E.I., B.R. 1542 eggs, 1656.2 points. 4th, Exp. Farm, Charlottetown, P.E.I., B.R. 1497 eggs, 1554.9 points. The total number of eggs laid for the week was 695 and to date 26704. VANCOUVER, B.
