It was officially announced over the week-end that the contract for the erection of the new Royal Bank building in Summerside had been awarded to Messrs. R. T. Holman, Limited, who, it is understood, have submitted the contract to the County Construction Company of Summerside and Charlottetown.

The new Royal Bank building when completed will be of one-story construction, modern in every way. It will have a forty-foot frontage and will extend approximately sixty feet back from the street with an addition at the rear for a vault, giving an overall length of seventy-four feet.

The appointment of Hon. H. H. Cox (above) as Minister of Public Works and Highways, was announced on Saturday by Premier J. Walter Jones.

George E. Barbour, Mr. Cox, who has the longest continuous service of any member in the Legislature, was first elected as a Liberal representative of Second King's in the general election held on June 25, 1927, and has been successful at every succeeding general election.

A non-portfolio member of the Government for some years, he has been acting Minister of Public Works and Highways on a previous occasion and has also been chairman of the Fishermen's Loan Board and the Province's representative on the Atlantic Herring Commission.

Ancient Tower To Bounce Waves Off Moon
ROUND SHOT FIRED AT NAPOLEON was made in the tower pictured on the left. Next year, redesigned as it is pictured on the right, it will fire radio waves at the moon, and visitors to the Festival of Britain, through the aerial of the radio telescope at the top, will be able to see them bouncing back on earth a few seconds later. The tower today, a London landmark, stands on a cleared bomb site on which the main exhibition of the great national festival is beginning to rise. In its converted form it will also be capable of receiving the arrival of radio waves from the sun, stars and meteors.
