The Wesleyan Mission Room receipts published last week include the following amounts from this Province—Pownall 12.50; Charlottetown Grace Church \$59.69.

The Northumberland arrived at this port at 8.05 Saturday night. It was owing to late train connections that the boat was delayed on Friday night and not the fog as appeared. The steamer made the trip in the usual time.

Elsewhere in today's Guardian is given particulars of the sailings of the Royal Line of steamships. Halifax has been chosen as the winter terminus for these splendid steamers which are most luxuriously equipped and excellent sea boats. Hyndman & Co., Ltd., are the agents in this city.

Rev. Mr. Morris, of Campbellton, N. B., formerly of Granville, P. E. I., has in his possession the remains of the papers and documents placed in a bottle and sealed, then deposited in the corner stone of the Methodist church in 1836. The bottle was broken and moisture destroyed the contents so far as the papers were concerned.

One of the first vessels to arrive in North Sydney from Prince Edward Island this year with produce is the schooner Shamrock, Captain Straight from Charlottetown. The Shamrock brought thirty-two bushels of potatoes which are selling at fifty cents a bushel. She has also for sale a quantity of beets and turnips and oats which are selling at sixty, forty and fifty cents a bushel respectively. These prices are somewhat in excess of last year's though it is likely that in a few weeks' time they will be reduced considerably. While rain fell in liberal quantities in Cape Breton during the past summer, there was a lack of it on Prince Edward Island which retarded growth of vegetables while the hay and oats crop benefited greatly. The Wesleyan says—St. John in general and the Methodist church in particular is about to suffer a great loss through the removal of J. N. Harvey to Vancouver. After speaking of his interest in all things affecting the welfare of the city, one of the local papers says: "In church work he has been equally active. He has been president of the Laymen's Association of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference since its inception three years ago, and he is representative in this conference of the mission board of the church in Canada. Therefore it took a part of three days to get a reply to a letter to or from Charlottetown and under existing arrangement it takes less than twenty-four hours and arrives one hour earlier each evening. Mr. Warburton, M. P., and Post Office Inspector Whear were instrumental in making the change. The farmers in this vicinity are all through harvesting and with few exceptions have finished digging potatoes. This has been a banner year with farmers here with one exception—pasture—and it is not expected that the returns for milk will be much more than half of that of last season.
