POINCARÉ BECOMES THE PRESIDENT OF FRANCE

WILL RECOGNIZE BRAVERY OF CAPT. SCOTT

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—In parliament this afternoon both parties practically agreed that Canada should officially recognize the bravery of Capt. Scott.

SKILFULLY HANDLED

ST. JOHN, Feb. 15.—Skillful handling of the big liner Athenia saved the lives of two men yesterday afternoon as the Donaldson steamer was coming to her dock after a stormy passage of thirteen days from Glasgow.

Directly ahead of the liner was a scow at the end of a long barge, and as the tug was too far from the carrier to steer it, those in charge of the steamer had either to run down the scow and drown or kill the men on it or stop the ship in the face of a stiff wind on the starboard quarter, with the shoal ground at the can buoy to port.

ITALIANS MUST BE GIVEN WORK

TORONTO, Feb. 15.—Neither the Board of Control nor Council has any power to pass a by-law or resolution discriminating between the different classes of citizens. Such was the advice received by the Board of Control this morning from Corporation Council Geary in connection with Ald. Robbins' motion that only English speaking men should be employed for such work as crew cleaning, etc., and that no foreigners should be employed unless no English speaking men could be found.

PLAYED VIOLIN AND WENT INSANE

TORONTO, Feb. 15.—While playing the Kreutzer Sonata on a violin in an east end residence on Tuesday night a young woman, known as Miss Lambert, became violently insane. She scratched the strings of the violin during the night and kept the whole family awake.

\$35,000 VERDICT FOR WIFE'S LOVE

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—A jury in the Monmouth county Court at Freshfield, N. J., yesterday awarded a verdict of \$35,000 to Malcolm Huffly, a Washington lawyer, against Theodore D. Wilson, formerly a member of the Consolidated Exchange of New York city, on the ground that Mr. Wilson had alienated Mrs. Huffly's affections. The action, which was for \$50,000, was undefended and grew out of the disappearance in 1909 of Mrs. Huffly and her two children from the Huffly home in Washington. Mr. Huffly employed detectives and caused the arrest of Mr. Wilson on a train while it was passing through Monmouth county, in which is Ashbury Park, where the warrant stated that Mrs. Huffly and Mr. Wilson had occupied the same cottage.
