CITY'S PROGRAMME FOR STREET AND SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION THIS YEAR

At the meeting of the City Council on Monday night the City Surveyor was authorized to have permanent sidewalks put down on the following streets:

Both sides of Weymouth from Sidney to Kent Street, walk to be four feet wide.

North side of Fitzroy St. from Cumberland to culvert near Escher St.—walk to be 3 feet 9 inches wide.

North side King Street from Prince to Weymouth—Walk to be 4 feet wide.

West side Ambrose St. from Brighton Road to Villa St.—walk to be 3 feet 9 inches wide.

North side King Street from Queen St. to Great George St.—walk to be 4 feet wide.

The City Surveyor was also authorized to grade and put down a gravel road bed on Orlebar Street from Euston to Gerald; on Fitzroy from Prince to Hillsborough; on King from Hillsborough to Weymouth, gravel for the above work to be brought from the gravel pit at Surrey, Lot 58.

It was ordered also that the City Surveyor be instructed to make a survey of Brighton Road in connection with the streets and roads leading north from same, as far as North River Road and report to the City Council the best system to be adopted so as to drain the storm water which collects in the vicinity, and also to prepare an estimate of cost of same.

Royal Commission On Shell Contracts

(From our own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, May 9.—With the ninth day of the Meredith-Duff Commission not a single fact was brought to light bearing out the charges that gave it birth. There was a change of Venue today when a witness from the International Arms and Fuse Co., took the stand, and occupied it all day. His evidence however simply went to confirm that of all the previous witnesses that no commission or consideration of any kind had been paid in securing contracts from the Shell Committee.

Mr. Patterson was a decidedly impressive witness, and gave his evidence in a cool and decisive manner that discouraged cross-examination. This was the more marked in that of Mr. Hellmuth in his examination in chief who again followed his practice of not only examining that witness but cross-examining him with an evident idea of bringing out every fact in the matter.

The result of this was that when Mr. Johnston's turn came for cross-examination there was little left for him to do. Mr. Patterson's evidence was entirely at variance with the statement made in Parliament by Mr. Kyle as to the part played by the International Arms and Fuse Company in its dealings with the Shell Committee.

With regard to the advances made by the Shell Committee of the International Arms and Fuse Company he stated that in financing the undertaking the advance made by the Shell Committee to his company were considerably less than the company had to make with regard to sub-contracting companies.

Not only the advances but much more money had been invested in the undertaking and he declared that a cancellation of the contract owing to delays in deliveries would have involved a loss to the three men who composed the International Arms and Fuse Company of over four million dollars.

Mr. Patterson in his evidence bore out the statements of previous witnesses that at the time these contracts for fuses were being let it was practically impossible to get them made in Canada within the time required, owing to the absence of the necessary machinery and exports. The point hereof was that the Shell Committee could be ordered to fill the shell orders from Canada and this was done.

It is expected that Mr. Patterson will resume the stand tomorrow morning and that he will be succeeded by Dr. Harris, who has been so prominently mentioned in connection with the International Arms and Fuse Co.

MR. MCKINNON'S CULVERT

Sir:—I notice in your edition yesterday morning that at a meeting of the City Councilors a letter was received signed by Mr. J. J. McKinnon claiming that the culvert built between his two properties by the City was perfectly satisfactory, but that north of the culvert the stream was filled up with stones, sticks, lumber and tinware; well the above is not correct; it is true that the culvert is satisfactory for Mr. McKinnon. Why should it not be? As to stones in the stream there are none whatever I might say and prove that the lumber and tinware obstructing the stream is because the water has to rise so high to run, in heavy rains and thaws, that the lumber is carried from my yard, and all the back yards are cleaned up along the stream. The culvert is not satisfactory where it stops to all the other property holders. Mr. J. J. McKinnon's signature may be good enough for the City Councilors, but I have twenty signatures to the effect that since this culvert has been built all the properties north of Mr. McKinnon are continually flooded and damaged.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but must be accompanied by a certificate of the District Office.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within six miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cult. is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WHAT CANADA PAYS!

SOLDIERS PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CONDITIONS OF ENLISTMENT PROVISION FOR WIVES, MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Canada is determined that her sons shall be as well paid and their families as well cared for, as a grateful and wealthy country can afford. The scale of pay for Overseas Service, the allowances from the Patriotic Fund, and the Pensions, are on a more liberal basis than those of any other country engaged in the war.

SCALE OF PAY

| RANK | Pay | Field Allowance | Separation Allowance |
|-------------------------------------|----------------|-----------------|----------------------|
| Sergeants..... | per day \$1.35 | \$0.15 | \$25.00 |
| Corporals..... | 1.10 | .10 | 20.00 |
| Private, Buglers, Drummers etc..... | 1.00 | .10 | 20.00 |

The men are, of course, fed and clothed by the Government.

The Separation Allowance is the sum paid by the Government to the wife of each enlisted man, or to the widowed mother if the son is unmarried and is her sole support. This is in addition to part of his pay which is reserved for her.

One-half of a soldier's pay is withheld by the Government and paid to his dependents. This ensures that at least \$35.00 per month is paid by the Government to the wife of each soldier.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND

The Patriotic Fund has been created to assist those dependents of a soldier who need more help than the Government gives. From this Fund the following sums are paid if the need exists:—

Ladies representing the Patriotic Fund pay regular visits to families of men on Overseas Service, and give friendly advice and practical help in case of need.

Many employers have pledged themselves to give preference to returned soldiers when engaging men.

PENSIONS

The Canadian scale of pensions range for private soldier, from \$75.00 per year for certain minor injuries to \$264.00 for total disability. In case of death \$22.00 a month is paid to the widow, and \$5.00 a month for each child. A widowed mother whose son was her whole support receives \$22.00 a month.
