TORONTO, July 10-(CP)—Gold shares recovered part of Tuesday's losses and the other groups also posted narrow index gains in today's trading on the Toronto stock exchange. Only 82,000 shares changed hands.

McDougal, Broulan, Chester-ville, East Malartic, Kirkland Lake and Preston all moved in sizable volume at better prices and a few others, including, Pickle, Fickie, Crow, Pioneer, Teck Hughes and Wright-Hargreaves, were stronger on light action.

Bell Telephone advanced 3 1-2. British American Oil, Imperial Oil and C.P.R. all tightened up moderately and Canada Packers advanced 10 points. Other industrials firmed a point or more including Bank of Commerce, Page-Hersey and Western Grocers pfd.

Royal Bank and Western Electric pfd were heavy and fractional losses were netted by B.C. Power A, Fanny Farmer, National Steel Car and Dominion Bridge.

Home Oil firmed 5 cents and Davies and Dalhousie were slightly higher.

MONTREAL, July 10-(CP)—There were 187 cattle, 68 sheep and lambs, 99 hogs and 225 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today, including 10 cattle held over.

Cattle were very slow and other classes of livestock were firm.

Calves were firm at \$6.25 for common light veals to \$9.00 for tops. The bulk of offerings were drinkers and were mostly \$5.50.

Good ewes and wethers were \$11.50 to \$12.00, buck lambs were cut \$1.00 per cwt. and culls \$2.00 per cwt. Sheep were \$3.50 to \$5.00.

Hogs were firm. The bulk of the hogs were sold on a rail grade basis at \$11.75 hot weight. A few small sales were made at \$9.00 for hockers off trucks. Sows were \$4.75 to \$5.50.

On Maritime markets, rail grade hogs were \$11.35 hot weight. No 1 sows weighing up to 270 pounds \$8.25, no 1 cows weighing over 270 pounds \$5.25, no 2 undesirable all weights \$4.25.

Choice steers were \$8.75, good \$8.25, medium \$7.50, fair \$6.50, and common \$4.50 to \$5.75. Choice heifers were \$9.25, good \$8.00, medium \$7.25, fair \$6.25, and common \$4.25 to \$5.50. Choice cows were \$5.75, good \$5.25, medium \$5.00 and fair \$4.50. Canners were \$2.50 to \$3.00 and cutters \$3.00 to \$4.00. Beoning bulls were \$3.50 to \$4.25 and butcher bulls were \$4.50 to \$5.50.

## GRAIN

WINNIPEG, July 10-(CP)—Not a single trade was completed in the wheat futures pit on Winnipeg exchange today as cautious traders refused to buy wheat even at the minimum levels of 71 3-8 cents a bushel for the July option, 73 5-8 for October and 74 5-8 for December. The pegged prices were inaugurated by the government May 14.

Today's stalemate came just two weeks after a similar performance by wheat traders on the Winnipeg exchange June 26. Then elevator companies ordered their western wheat belt agencies to halt wheat purchases until further notice, except under the Canadian wheat board agreement which allows a farmer to sell up to 5,000 bushels at the minimum figure of 70 cents a bushel on a basis no 1 northern, Port William.

The stand-off two weeks ago also brought the announcement of minimum contract grades of cash wheat.

## FINANCE

NEW YORK, July 10-(AP)—Utility holding company stocks sprang to the front of a slow-moving market today and some pushed ahead 2 or 3 points.

Distillers Seagram, preferred, led the gainers in the Canadian section with a jump of five points. Dome and International Nickel finished up fractions while Brazilian Tracton lost 1-8.

Outstanding were the senior shares of American Power and Light and Commonwealth & Southern.

Elsewhere in the share list, prices continued to drift.

War stocks mostly went lower. Down fractions to around a point at the finish were Douglas, Bethlehem, United Aircraft, Sperry, American Smelting, Anaconda, Goodyear and Phelps Dodge.

Improving the strength in the power group, American Telephone sold off more than a point. Standard Oil of New Jersey rose 1 3-8.

The Associated Press composite price of 60 stocks was unchanged at 41.2. Transactions amounted to 282,140 shares against 303,530 in the preceding session.

## British Planes Justify Faith of Their Crews

LONDON, July 10-(CP)—Experience in full-scale air war since opening of the "blitzkrieg" has built up confidence of the Royal Air Force in the technical superiority of British bomber and fighter aircraft. This superiority is due to their armament, design and the man power which they are flying.

In current British fighters the emphasis is on multiple rifle-cannon-bomb machine guns. Britain's bombers have heavy defensive armament. Variations of the standard armament, including use of cannon, have been employed on some types, British and German. The word "cannon" is a general term for large bore, shell-firing machine guns.

Here is how the famous British (B) types compare in armament with their German (G) opposites:

FIGHTERS: (B) Hawker Hurricane: eight machine guns. (G) Heinkel 112: two machine guns, two cannon in wings.

(B) Vickers Spitfire: eight machine guns. (G) Messerschmitt 109: four machine guns, one cannon.

(B) Boulton-Paul Defiant: multiple guns in turret; also Bristol Blenheim; nest of guns under fuselage, one gun in rear turret. (G) Messerschmitt 110: four forward guns, two rear guns, two cannon.

BOMBERS: (B) Handley-Page Hampden; two forward guns, four rear guns. (G) Dornier 17: two fixed guns, two movable guns.

(B) Armstrong-Whitworth Whitley; one forward gun, four rear guns. (G) Junkers 88; three gun positions.

## WAR RESTRICTS HOME-MADE JAM

LONDON, July 10-(CP)—While on account of war restrictions, sugar will not be available for British households in making jam from purchased fruit, people will be able to get sufficient for preserving the fruit they grow themselves.

Housewives who have been accustomed to buy fruit and make their own jam have been warned they are not likely to be able to buy additional sugar for that purpose just now, though when the plum crop is ripe a limited amount of sugar may be available.

Because supplies are greatly restricted and fruit imports are greatly reduced, it is thought that canners and manufacturers who are now more dependent on the home crop would have it. Otherwise there would be a shortage of jam for home consumption as well as for the fighting forces.

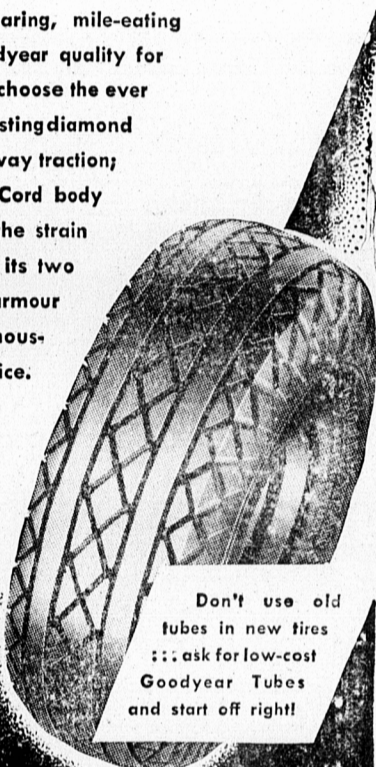

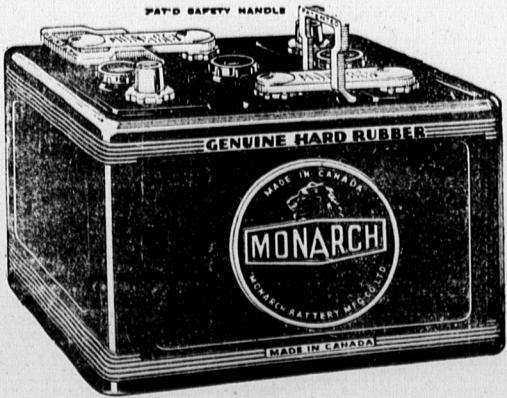
