**MORE ACTIONS AGAINST SHOE MACHINERY Co.**

**BOSTON, Jan. 31.**—Alleging that the United Shoe Machinery Company had unconsciously violated the Sherman Act, and that, therefore, the statutes of limitations do not apply, Chas. A. Strout, of Portland, Me., Trustee of the Godda Sons Metal Fastening Company, filed a second suit in the Federal Court today. Damages of \$5,000,000 are asked. The plaintiff charges that through false representations three officials of the company succeeded in preventing the Godda Company from competing

with the United States. The first suit failed by limitation on the ground that it was not instituted until more than six years after the indictment of the alleged offence.
