Chocolate Frosting
Or for your cup cakes, turn the egg yolks into a rich frosting. Two egg yolks, 1 cup confectioner's sugar, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1-4 cup milk, 3 squares bitter chocolate melted, 1 tablespoon soft butter, few grains of salt.
Combine ingredients in order given and beat with rotary beater until blended. Set bowl in pan of ice or ice water and beat until thick enough to spread (3 to 5 minutes).
Quick Cup Cakes
Reversing the problem, what can you do with the two egg whites after using the yolks? Here's the fitting answer.
One-third cup soft shortening, 1 cup of sugar, 2 egg whites, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1-2 teaspoon of salt 1-4 cup sifted flour, 2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup milk. Put all ingredients into bowl in order given. Beat all vigorously for 2 minutes and bake as cup cakes in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.)

21,000 Sealskins In Fur Auction

ST. LOUIS, May 22.—(AP)—Nearly 21,000 seal skins went on sale today in the United States Government's semi-annual auction.
In addition to the sealskins offered 700 American and European buyers, 400 blue fox and 10 sea otter pelts, all processed here, were listed. The skins were taken under Government supervision at the Pribilof Islands off the Alaskan coast.
