250 Printing Plants Closed in New York

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Two hundred and fifty New York printing plants employing 10,000 men and publishing nearly all of the magazines and trade journals issued in New York, as well as a large percentage of the books printed here, were closed today by a simultaneous lockout and strike. The employers have issued orders that their plants are to remain closed until such times as they can be reopened with forces composed exclusively of members of the international union.

British Troops Occupy Odessa

VIENNA, Oct. 1.—Troops from the British fleet in the Black Sea have been landed in Odessa and have occupied the city according to advices received in Budapest.
