Hints for the Motorist

BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH. ENGINE "DIES" UNEXPECTEDLY. T. B. Writes: My Ford engine has good power, but occasionally it will suddenly die. Sometimes, when it is about to do this, I throw in low gear and it will start again, but usually it dies when on low gear. Once in a while, by turning the engine over a few turns, it can be started. There is no certainty of getting home with a car in this condition. I think there is no trouble with the carburetor, as it is a new one and gasoline flows through it. Can you give me any help?

Answer: This seems to us to be an ignition trouble which comes on suddenly. Probably it is due to a loose connection or a defective place in the wiring. This is probably in some part of the primary ignition circuit, which is common to all the cylinders. You better go over all the connections, and the switch and timer wiring in detail.

There may be trouble in the magneto winding. Why don't you put in a set of dry cells, connected to the battery side of the switch, and see if you still have trouble? This would decide whether there was magneto trouble. If your engine stops without any warning, ignition trouble is indicated, but if it gradually weakens, misses and pops in the carburetor, you may suspect carburetion trouble.

Knocks When Throttle is Opened

O. W. B. Writes: Sometime ago a knock developed in my engine, which is most noticeable when running at slow speed and the throttle is suddenly opened, but is present all the time. The connecting rod and main bearings have been tightened. May it be the wrist pins that are causing this? What advice can you give me?

Answer: Beside the carbon knock, the one which "shows up" most noticeably, when opening the throttle to accelerate, is the loose piston knock, which is sort of a rattling sound. If your pistons have worn considerably underize they may be making the noise that you hear. Quite likely your piston pins may have worn considerably but the knock that they make is usually not a very loud one. If your knock is heavy and rather dull, the main bearings may still be in trouble despite your tightening them; the flywheel may not be perfectly tight on the shaft; the engine may be loose on the frame or the spark setting may be somewhat early. Are your timing gears perfectly tight on the shafts?

ABOUT CLOGGED MUFFLERS

P. R. Asks: What are the signs that a muffler is choked? Is it likely that a muffler of a car that has been used five years in this condition? How can it be cleaned out?

Answer: Reduced speed at full throttle and missing that cannot be attributed to ignition or carburetor derangement, overheating of the cooling water, not due to the ordinary causes; great increase in available engine power when cut-out is opened or muffler can be clogged especially if rich mixtures have been used and there is much oil escape through the exhaust. Taking a muffler apart, scraping the internal surfaces and cleaning out the gas passages is the only effective way, although much of the obstructing material can be loosened and blown out if the muffler is tapped all over with a hammer, when the engine is running.
