Owing to the heavy seaweed it was impossible to make any headway swimming. The report was neither written nor published by anyone taking part in the matter but an eye witness of the accident informed a prominent citizen who gave the facts to the Guardian. Mr. Kennedy therefore fully merits all praise for his courage and time-assistance."

In the middle ages Germany came to the fore as a hotbed of mystic teaching. Eckhart, 1257 to 1329, and John Tauler, of Stassburg, 1290-1361, were the foremost exponents of mystic thought. A POSITIVE CURE FOR TIRED BUSINESS MEN

Ex-Lord Mayor's Death Accelerated by Drug

LONDON, July 25.—The mystery surrounding the death of Sir Alfred Newton, former Lord Mayor of London, and chairman of Harrods' big store, has not been cleared up by the coroner's inquest, the jury's verdict being death from heart failure accelerated by strychnine poisoning, but no evidence of how the strychnine came to be in his medicine bottle. Sir Alfred collapsed June 9th and died suddenly in an automobile at the door of Harrods' stores shortly after taking a dose of medicine ordered for indigestion which had been compounded in Harrods'. There was no strychnine in the prescription, but on analysis it was found that the bottle contained seventeen grains which expert tests showed must have been put in in the form of a solution. Harrods' dispenser gave evidence showing strychnine was not in the prescription the day Sir Alfred's medicine was compounded, and the checks on the poisons made it impossible that any unauthorized persons could get at the poison cupboard. Nor was any evidence offered throwing suspicion on anybody. Lady Newton, his widow, is in precarious health and could not attend the inquest, and her son, being asked what the family relations were, declared: "I don't think there ever were man and woman who so loved each other."

INCREASED PENSION OF C. N. R. MEN
Retired employees of the C. N. R. receiving the minimum pension of \$20 per month, will hereafter receive \$30 per month according to information received at the office of L. R. Ross today. The increased pension will take from April 1st, last.
