THE GUARDIAN LOCAL NEWS

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The Princess arrived last night at 8.15 and express at 10.05.

YESTERDAY was Thanksgiving Day in the United States, and being a holiday there was no stock market.

The S.S. City of London goes to Crapaud tomorrow morning at 7.00 and to Vernon River Bridge on Monday at 10.00 a.m.

FOUR cargoes of P.E. Island produce arrived yesterday—consisting of 15,000 bushels of potatoes, 1000 bushels of oats, 35 bushels of carrots and 40 bbls of oysters.—Halifax Chronicle.

Rev. Dr. Gates, St. John, chairman of the committee on Baptist union, says that up to the present time 121 churches in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island had passed unanimous resolutions in favor of the scheme.

DURING the past few days a number of boys have been making a practice of shooting pigeons on the outskirts of the city. This pastime is a dangerous one for those who may be in the vicinity as well as a needless slaughter of an inoffensive bird.

The outward cargo of the Bonavista on her last trip of the season from this Province yesterday took 3,300 bags oats, 780 bags potatoes, 45 boxes butter, 36 barrels oysters, 153 bags turnips, 24 brls pork and sundries. She carried on deck 6 cattle, 38 sheep and 8 pigs.

The tea and fancy sale of the King's Daughters held in St. Paul's schoolroom yesterday was well attended, although the weather was so disagreeable. The proceeds realized amounted to a neat sum. The ladies are to be congratulated upon the success of their annual sale.

The North End, St. John, sandbagging case, in which Frank Priest was the victim, has not yet been solved. No clue, so far as can be learned, has been found.

THE St. Francis Xavier football team leave this morning on return home. Last night they were entertained by the students of St. Dunstan's and a jolly time was spent within the old College walls. The boys from Antigonish are a jolly crowd of good fellows who know how to enjoy as well as to give a good time.

No news received yet of the steamer Donald, whose wreckage is supposed to have littered the North Shore of P. E. I., and which is believed to have foundered in the gale of Monday night, Nov. 14, while bound with a cargo of fished dolomite from Marble Mountain, Cape Breton, to Chatham, N. B. Her crew of fifteen men were shipped in New York, and their names are not known here. Previous to coming to North Sydney for this trip the Donald was employed in the fruit trade between the West Indies and New York, where she was owned. She was built in Liverpool thirty years ago and was 500 tons register.

EIGHTY years ago the Rev. Donald McDonald, a faithful though eccentric minister, left Scotland and came to Nova Scotia. Two years he toiled in Cape Breton, with zeal and earnestness, enduring great hardships. His feet were covered with untanned moosehide. He walked on snowshoes and blazed his way through the pathless forest with a hatchet. He was contented with the chance shelter of the rudest hut or shanty, and with the coarsest fare. He carried no scrip, and what little money he received he divided with the poor. Afterward he removed to P. E. Island, where he died 37 years ago, aged 81, spending 50 years in the ministry. It is said that he baptised more children, married more couples, travelled more miles and built more churches than any other minister in the history of Canada. Though long since dead, many still revere his memory, and not a few look back to him as their spiritual father.—Hants Journal.

Rev. G. M. Campbell, of St. John, passed through the city yesterday morning to his old home in Wallace, N. S., where he is to preach the dedicatory sermon this morning at the opening of the Methodist church at that place. The new church is built on the site of the old Wallace Methodist church which had stood for about one hundred years. The Wallace church has played a notable part in Methodist history in the maritime provinces. Not only is the church one of the oldest in the provinces, but the Wallace circuit has probably contributed more men to the Methodist ministry than any other in the neighboring province. No less than forty ministers have been sent out from that circuit and many of them have proved a power in the Methodist denomination. Of the forty many are today engaged in active work in the maritime provinces and throughout the Dominion. Rev. Mr. Campbell, who was among those who received his early Christian training in the Wallace church and was later recommended by that church for the ministry, naturally felt highly honored in being selected to preach at the dedication of the church. He has remained in the N. B. P. E. I. conference ever since he finished his theological course at Mount Allison. He has been pastor of all the leading churches in the conference and is rightly regarded as one of the ablest Methodist ministers in the three Provinces. The honors therefore conferred upon him by the church of his native town was quite fitting.—Moncton Times.

Miss MAGGIE ROBINSON, of Charlottetown, who is visiting relatives here, is wanted as a witness in the Charlottetown murder case. The hearing was adjourned awaiting the return of Miss Robinson, who was the first to discover the body of the murdered woman.—Moncton Transcript.

W. T. WRIGHT, of Belemore, P. E. I., member of the graduate class of '98 of Mount Allison, was recently elected president of the '06 class of Trent's Dental College, Boston. This is the class of which Messrs. H. S. Thomson and Geo. Tingley, of Moncton, and other provincialists are members of.

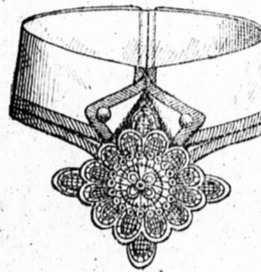

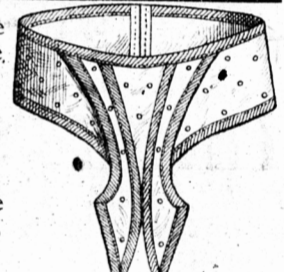
