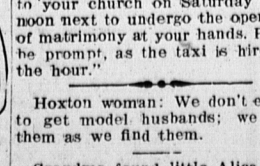

Institute Convention

FIRST DISTRICT CONVENTION OF THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HELD IN NORTH LAKE LAST FRIDAY AFTERNOON AND EVENING.

The first District Convention of the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island took place in North Lake Hall on November 6th, the Institute of Elmira, East Point, South Lake, Lakeview, St. Columba and Priest Pond taking part.

The afternoon session opened at 2.30 P. M. with the singing of O Canada, Mrs. J. E. Dugwell, the Hostess President, in her address of welcome said: "On me devolves the pleasant duty of bidding you welcome this afternoon to the First District Convention of the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island. We are glad to meet you, and to know that a bond exists between the women of the districts represented here, strong enough to draw them together in unity. Let us not forget that this convention entails responsibilities, and I trust that our deliberations here to-day may be along the lines of cautious progress, rather than of drastic innovation. And let me assure you and every delegate that the cold November atmosphere exists only out doors; that to this hall, and to our homes we extend you a hearty welcome."

Mrs. Angus Beaton, the President of East Point Institute in her response to the address of welcome said that since their organization the Institutes had proved to be a benefit to the school to the community and to the country, and that in their unity should be strength to carry on even greater work.

Histories of the Institutes of this division since their organization were listened to with keen interest, and each history was followed by a number from each Club. Mrs. J. H. Baker of Lakeview rendered a solo "My Work is Done," in her usual pleasing manner. A reading on "Public Speaking," which was very appropriate to the occasion was given by Miss Mary Lannigan of St. Columba. Recitations were exceptionally well given by Mrs. Leo McDonald, South Lake, and Miss Laura Campbell, Elmira. A solo "Mary of Argyle" by Miss Dorothy Keays, received very hearty applause.

The last number on the afternoon programme was a most instructive demonstration on "Millinery," by Miss Evelyn Windsor, Assistant Supervisor, and one in which the members showed great interest.

At the close of the afternoon session a delicious tea was served, and a very pleasant social time was spent.

At the evening session, which was open to the public, Mrs. Aeneas McPhee, President of Elmira Institute, presided. The first half hour was devoted to Community Singing, after which a Question Box was conducted by Miss Helen Mathieson, Supervisor.

A lecture on "Health in the Public Schools," of much interest to the Institutes who are working continually for the improvement of the schools, was given by Miss Mona Wilson, Chief Red Cross Nurse in a very concise and interesting manner.

Miss Kathleen Hornby, one of Charlottetown's most talented violinists, rendered "Sourven" very effectively, and received hearty applause. For an encore she played the old favourite, "Annie Laurie."

Mr. J. O. Hyndman, President of the Associated Boards of Trade of Prince Edward Island, was loudly applauded when called upon for his lecture on "Economic Conditions in our Province," and his remarks were listened to with deep interest. During the course of his lecture he presented a resolution regarding Mail Order Houses, and a motion was made to the effect that the resolution be placed before the Institutes for further consideration.

At the conclusion of Mr. Hyndman's helpful and educational lecture, remarks were made by Mr. H. H. Acorn of Souris.

A hearty vote of thanks was then tendered Miss Wilson, Miss Hornby and Mr. Hyndman for their generous assistance, which added so materially to the first District Convention.

The singing of the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.

Cakes were then auctioned off in aid of the orphanage.
