GENERAL FRENCH'S VICTORY.

Our despatches announce a victory for General French at Colesburg as the result of movements which seem to have been carefully planned. The forces engaged were not large. The country in the vicinity of Colesburg is comparatively open and therefore much more favorable for the movements of cavalry and field artillery than in the rough regions where Generals Buller and Gatacre are operating.

Congratulations to Fred McRae of Pownal. Among the many crack shots of the Canadian Regiment he was the first choice to sight and direct the fire of a Maxim gun. His many friends in Pownal and about the Island will await with deep interest the tidings from the first battle in which the Canadian Maxims are engaged.

The Maxim gun is one of many machine guns designed for use in modern warfare. The French mitrailleuse, the Gatling, the Gardner and other machine guns are more or less of one class. Both Gatling and Maxim were American inventors. The Gatling gun has from five to ten barrels with separate lock for each barrel. The Maxim Gun, the invention of Hiram Maxim, has a single barrel, something after the fashion of a revolver. It has the advantage that the force of the recoil brings a second cartridge instantly into position and when once started pours a continuous stream of bullets upon the enemy. A water chamber surrounding the machinery keeps the parts cool. It is fitted with a bullet-proof shield to protect the gunners against rifle fire from the front. Of course the shield would be no defence against artillery.
